

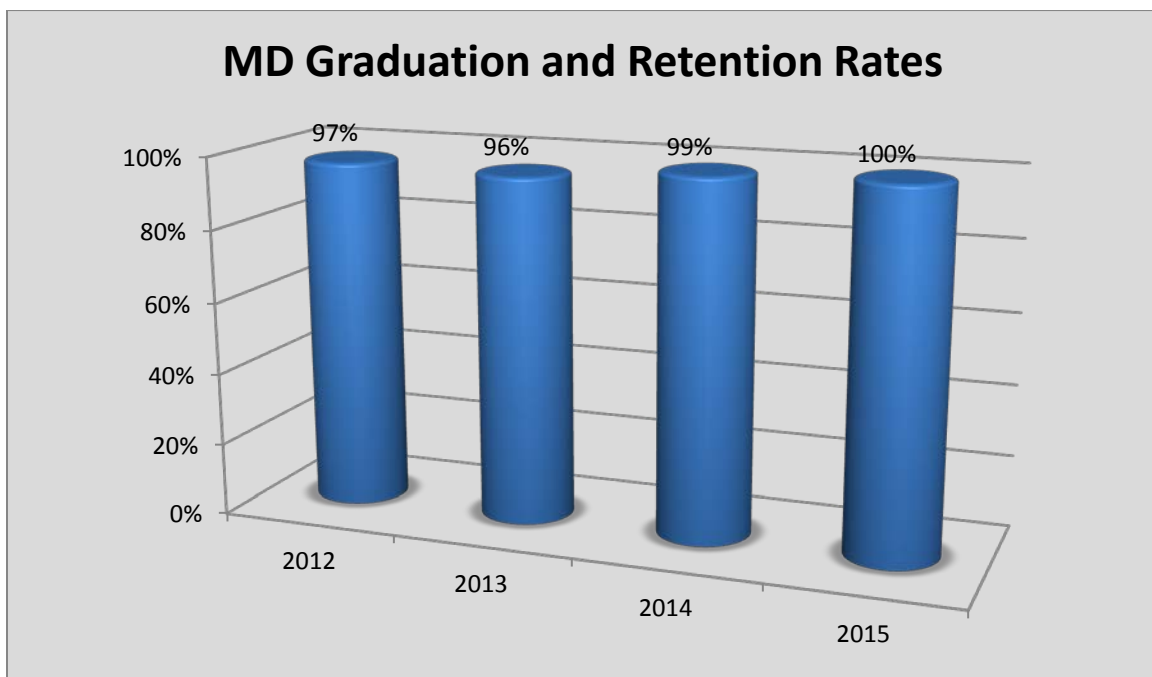

Rates are based on 2016 Fall enrollment data.

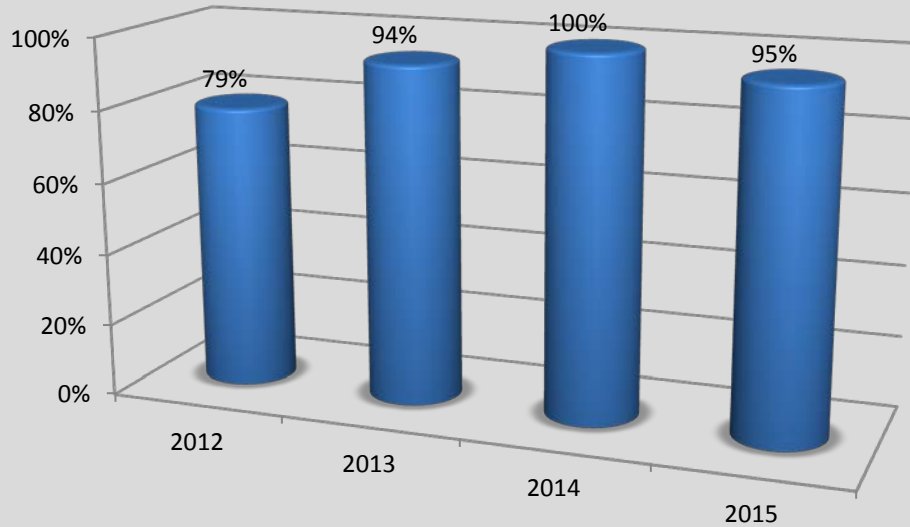

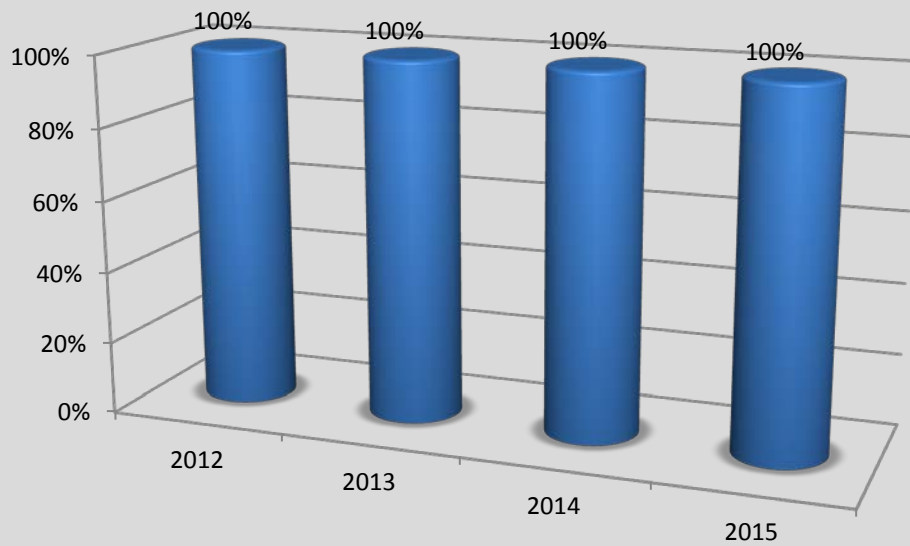
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MPH Graduation and Retention Rates

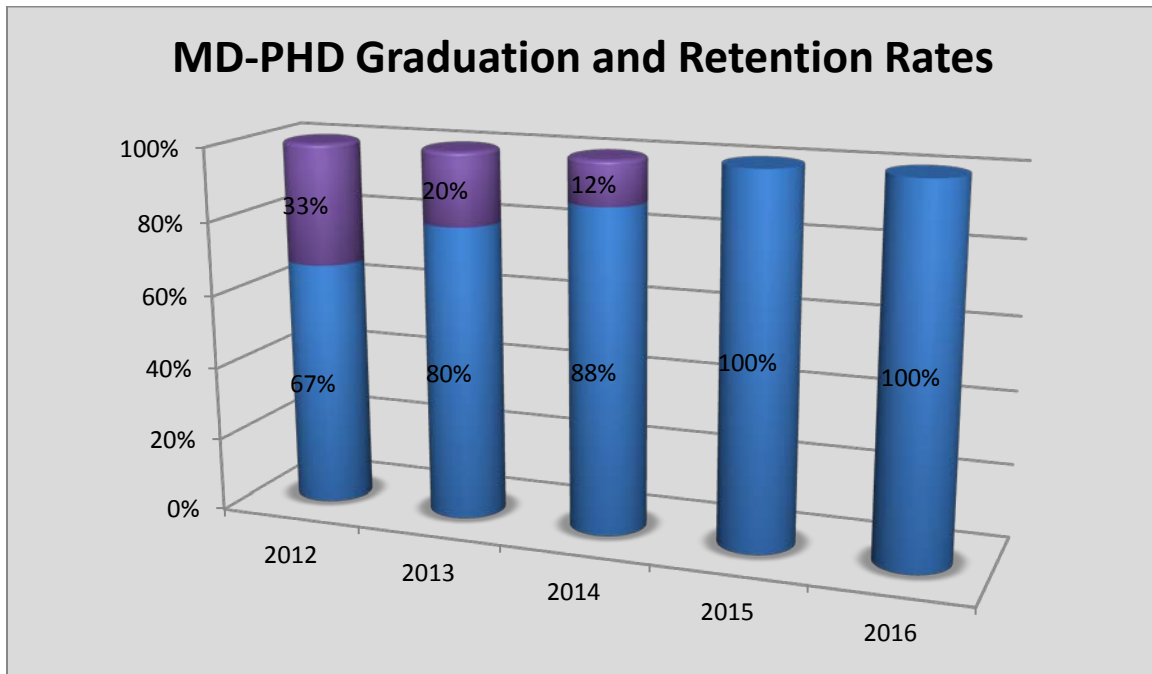


MD-MPH Graduation and Retention Rates

Employment or placement after graduation

Since 2010, the program has graduated 102 students with an MPH degree. Information on employment and placement after graduation is collected through graduation exit surveys and ongoing communication with alumni. Of the 102 graduates, 68.6 percent were employed; 24.51% are currently seeking additional education; 3.92% are actively seeking employment; and 2.94% are lost to follow-up.

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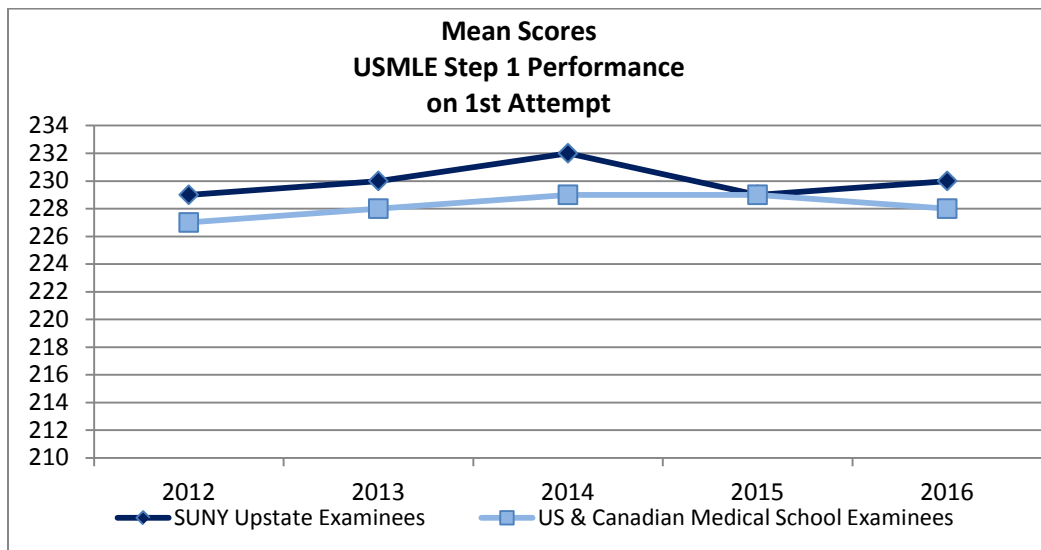
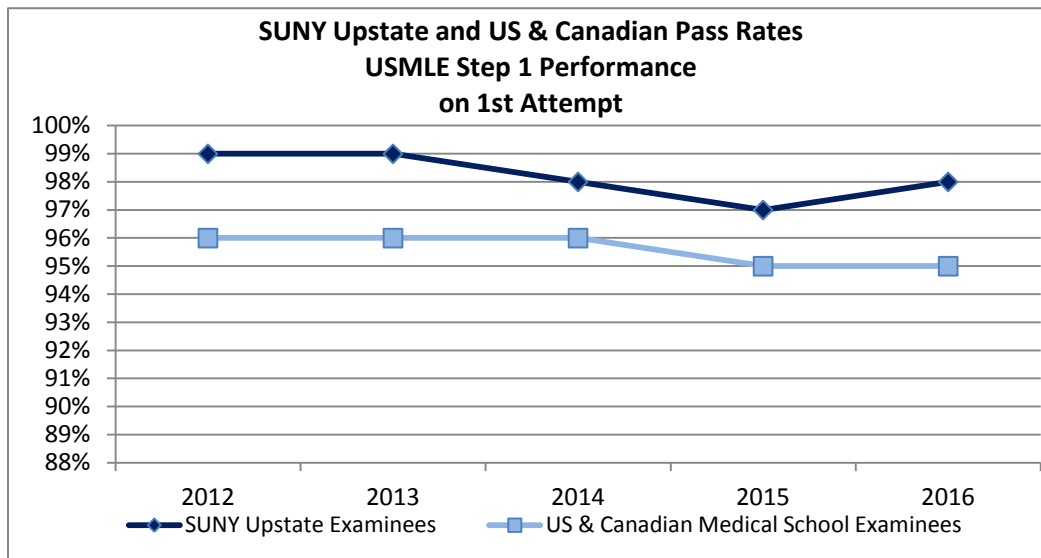

Performance on Licensing and Certification Exams

STEP 1

The **USMLE Step 1** is the first part of the United States Medical Licensing Examination (USMLE) that “ensures mastery of not only the sciences that provide a foundation for the safe and competent practice of medicine in the present, but also the scientific principles required for maintenance of competence through lifelong learning. Step 1 is constructed according to an integrated content outline that organizes basic science material along two dimensions: system and process.”²



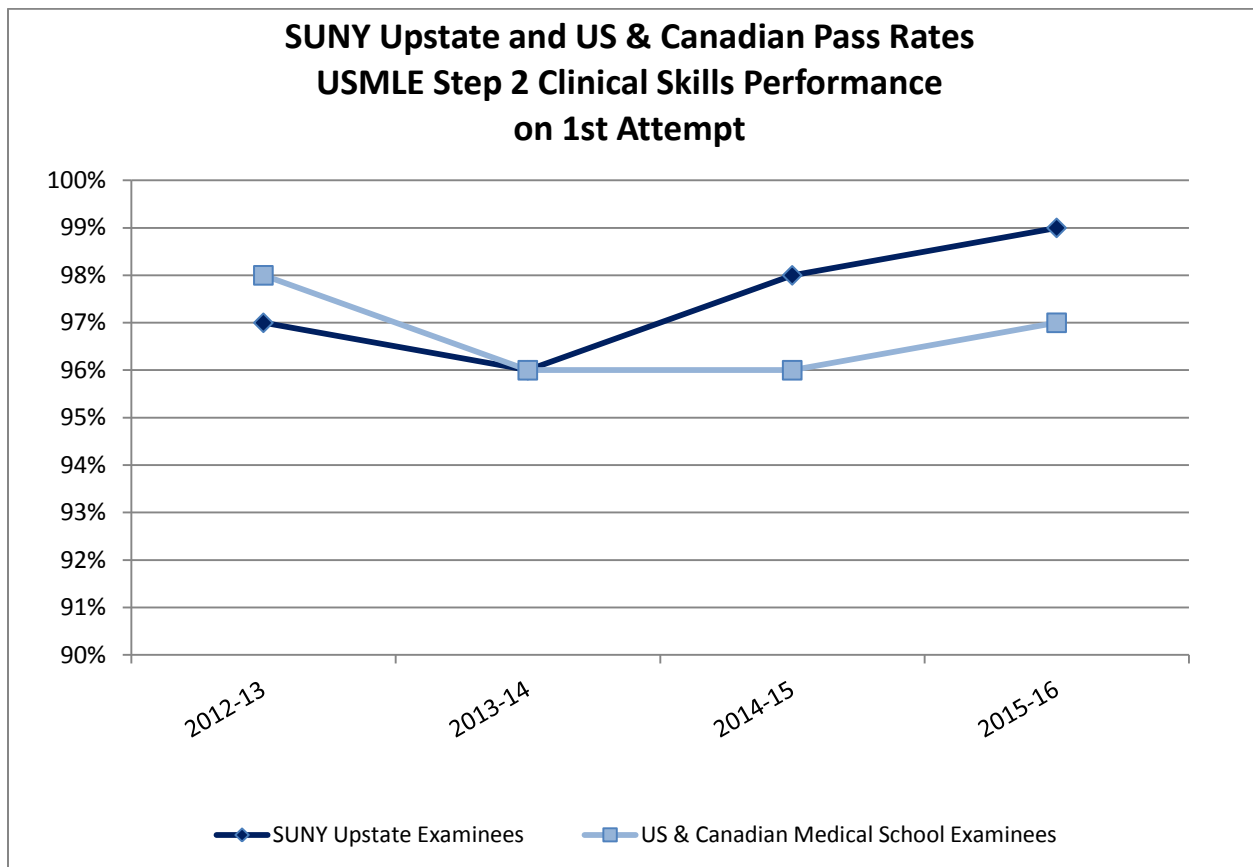

The **USMLE Step 2 Clinical Skills (CS) Exam** “ensures that due attention is devoted to the principles of clinical sciences and basic patient- centered skills that provide the foundation for the safe and effective practice of medicine.”³

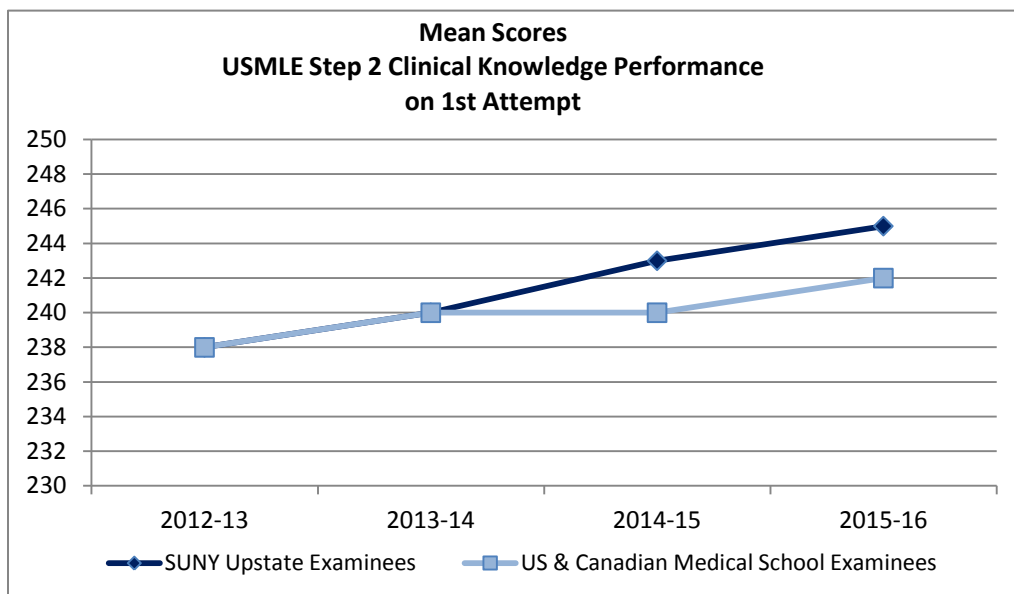
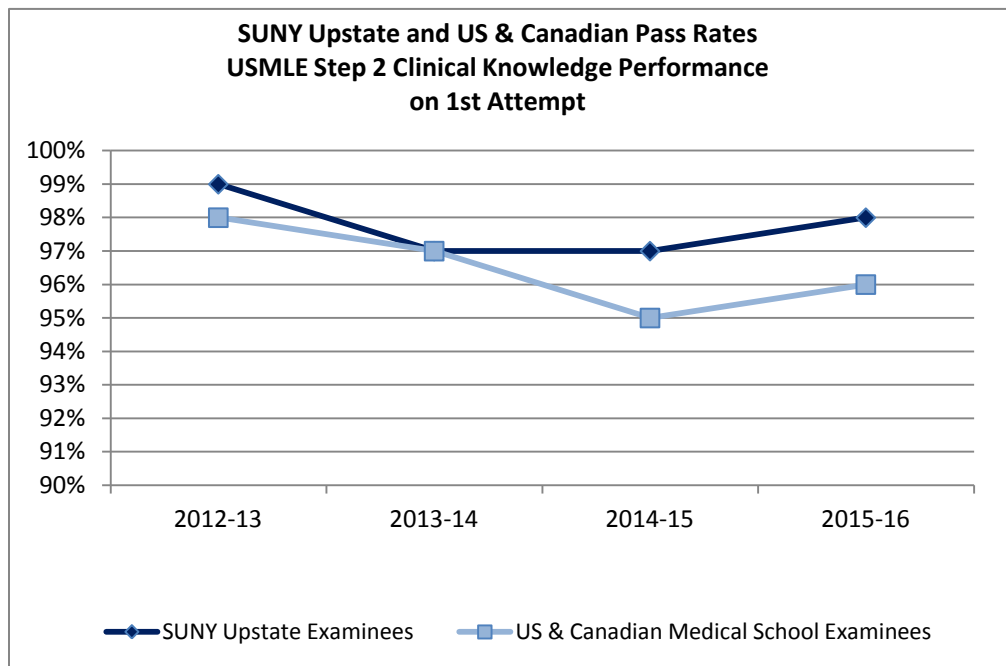

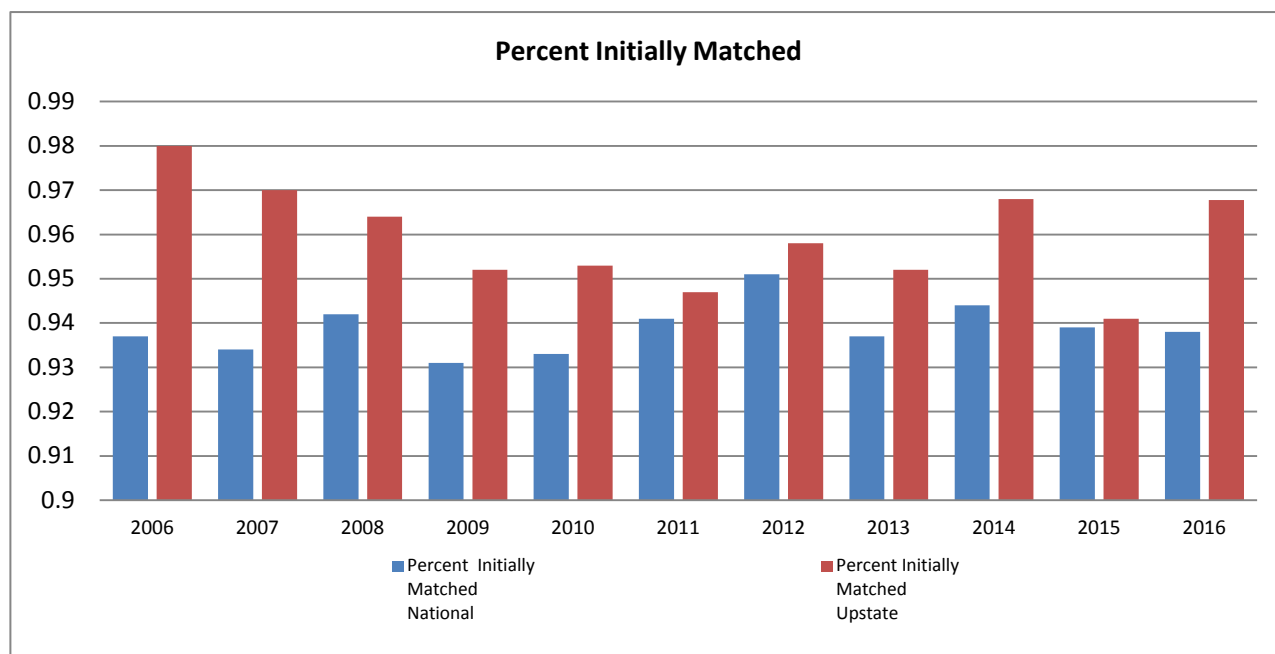
