The AAP Report

Editor's Note: *Dr. Roberts is one of our AAP resident reps. He represented us well at the 2016 Conference in October and shares the following report:*

The national AAP conference is a yearly event where thousands of pediatricians and trainees including residents, fellows and students gather to discuss relevant topics in pediatrics, learn updated guidelines and hear about cutting edge research and innovations in the field through 5 days of lectures, workshops and plenary sessions. One aspect of the convention is the section on trainees, where residents get together with their districts to discuss and vote on issues and resolutions relevant to their individual regions and programs. District 2 (New York State) discussed addressing poverty, literacy, and cyber bullying in NYS. The AAP president, Dr. Benard Dreyer spoke passionately about advocating for all children, regardless of citizenship, race, religion, sexual preference or gender. Some points that he focused on that really stuck with me based on our population at Upstate are that immigrants and refugees (regardless of legal status in the US) are children too and it is our duty to care for them and act in their best interest at all times, not just once they are naturalized and become "our" patients. He also reiterated that for transgender youth, pediatricians should not be their first bully. What he meant for that is that vulnerable teens and younger children questioning their gender identity need to feel supported, ideally by their family, but at the very least, by their doctor, and I feel this is something we excel at in our institution.

Throughout the conference, we were encouraged to question stereotypes. A story was told where a father and son are in a car accident and the father is tragically killed on the spot. The son, badly injured, is taken to the hospital. In the emergency room, the surgeon consulted looks at the boy and says "I cannot operate on this boy. He is my son!" to which the question was posed, who is the surgeon? Audience members fumbled offering that perhaps there were two dads or the surgeon meant "son" figuratively or spiritually when in reality, the surgeon was the boy's mother- the simplest answer, yet one many fail to consider initially despite the

innumerable female surgeons at their individual institutions.

Saturday night there was a poster presentation at the San Francisco Exploratorium where trainees could speak about interesting cases at their respective hospitals followed by an evening of discovery at one of the most innovative and long-standing science museums in the country. Lastly, we focused on ways to get out the vote- and vote with children in mind. Although children make up roughly 20-25% of our population, they compose 100% of our future, and many candidates have wildly different stances on what is best for them. From vaccines to contraceptives to adoption, whatever your stance, not voting is not an option, and the AAP section on trainees implored residents to ask their programs for time to vote on election day. I met pediatricians from over 10 countries and discussed current events and recommendations from resident representatives from a dozen different programs.

The Chill Spot

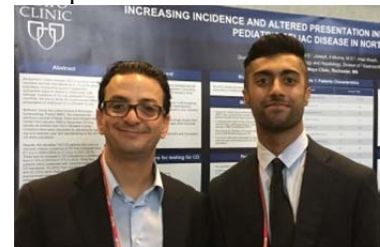
