FROM THE DEAN | BY THE NUMBERS

I was asked last week by a faculty member if I had any recruiting statistics. Yes, indeed I do. With the need to report to accrediting bodies such as Middle States, we gather an immense number of statistics using databases, surveys, and sometimes-brute force counting. I figured I would share some of them with all of you.

- · We currently have 128 students in the College of Graduate Studies
- Graduates of our college, between 2007 and 2012, published on average 3.8 publications from their graduate work (with 2.2 being first author).
- · According to Google scholar, those publications have been cited on average 23.6 times each.
- · Over the last three years, 100% of our PhD graduates have secured employment in their field.
- The average time to degree for students that have graduated in the last five years is 5.9 years, in comparison the natural average in life sciences is 6.9 years.
- A recent survey of our graduates indicated that a majority of them felt they were better prepared for their current employment than their work peers, and no one felt they were less prepared.

- Graduate students directly help support more than \$13,000,000 in federal grant support at Upstate.


