William Wickman, of North Miami, FL, died October 2005. Dr. Wickman started his medical career as a general surgeon and switched to general practice later in life. He served as an Army physician during World War II, in both the European and Pacific theaters. He achieved the rank of Major. Wickman cared for the wounded from the Battle of the Bulge and was flown from India over the Himalayas into Shanghai, China. She then enrolled in the College of Medicine and was the only woman in her class, from which she graduated, summa cum laude. Dr. White became chief resident of pediatrics at Buffalo Children's Hospital in 1945. In 1947, she and her husband, the late Nicholas Oddo, MD, moved to Long Beach, CA, where they built a small office building. White joined the planning committee for the Children's Hospital in Long Beach and remained an active voice on its Board of Trustees for many years. An advocate for children, White was also committed to the Long Beach Children's Clinic. In 1977, after practicing pediatrics in Long Beach for more than 30 years, White gifted her office building to the Memorial Medical Center

Foundation. This resulted in the establishment of three Katherine White, MD, Endowments at the Memorial Foundation for: The Children's Clinic, the White Guest Lectureship for Pediatric Education, and the Memorial Arthritis Clinic. White is survived by her husband, Scott; her sister-in-law, Marion Oddo; three grandchildren; and one great-granddaughter.
