**Peter P. Fiore**, of Wyckoff, NJ, died December 9, 2005. Dr. Fiore completed a residency in pathology and general surgery at Kings County Medical Center in Brooklyn. From 1944 to 1947, he was a battalion surgeon in Normandy, Belgium, Luxembourg, and Germany. Early in his career, he helped develop blood banking at Kings County Hospital. He is survived by his wife, Myrtle; his sons, Andrew C. Fiore, MD, and Peter P. Fiore, Jr., Esq.; his daughter, Gay Hartigan; six grandchildren and two sisters.

**Israel J. Rosefsky**, of Binghamton, NY, died October 21, 2005. Dr. Rosefsky was a pediatrician, artist, author, and philanthropist. He worked his way through Syracuse University and Syracuse College of Medicine. During World War II he served in the Army Medical Corps. Rosefsky was a benefactor who generously supported many organizations. Rosefsky retired at age 88. He is survived by his sons, Jonathan and Quinn; his daughter, Robin; eight grandchildren; and one great-granddaughter.

**Eugene W. Anthony**, of Oswego, NY, died March 10. Dr. Anthony practiced ophthalmology in Fulton for 50 years. He donated his time and service to FOCUS Eye Clinic at Les Cayes, Haiti. During World War II, he enlisted in the U.S. Army Medical Corps and became an ophthalmologist at the 52nd General Hospital Detachment in Kidderminster, England. He is survived by his daughters, Gail Drohan, Donna Evans, and Wendy Krebs; eight grandchildren; 14 great-grandchildren; and several nieces and nephews.

**Frederic N. Silverman** of Palo Alto, CA, died March 15. A pioneering pediatric radiologist, Dr. Silverman was instrumental in alerting the medical community and public on the use of radiology to detect child abuse. The first full-time director of the Division of Roentgenology at Cincinnati Children's Hospital, Silverman authored more than 160 journal and textbook articles, mostly on pediatric skeletal diseases, and was the recipient of numerous awards. His landmark article "The Roentgen Manifestations of Unrecognized Skeletal Trauma in Infants," published in the *American Journal of Radiology* in 1953, defined inflicted trauma as the etiology of the entity now known as child abuse. He is survived by his wife, Carolyn; several nieces and nephews; and numerous great nieces and nephews.

**March 1943**

**Martin F. Hilfinger, Jr.**, of Fayetteville, NY, died February 2. Dr. Hilfinger was a captain in the U.S. Army Medical Corps and served in Europe until the end of World War II. He was an associate professor of pathology at Upstate and became Onondaga County's first full-time medical examiner—a position he held for 20 years. Hilfinger was a specialist in the pathology of cancer and received the annual award of the New York State division of the American Cancer Society in 1956. He is survived by his wife, Nancy; his daughters, Sarah Tomb and Heidi Wilson; his son, Martin, III; his brother, Robert; seven grandchildren; four great-grandchildren, and several nieces and nephews.

**Donald S. Raines**, of Naples, NY, died February 2. Dr. Raines served in all three branches of the U.S. Armed Forces during the Korean Conflict. From 1972 to 1974, he presided as president of the medical staff at Rochester General Hospital and also served as chief of staff of otolaryngology. In 1966, Raines was bestowed the Edward Mott Moore Award from the Medical Society of Monroe County. His greatest pride was in helping to found the Monroe Plan, a local HMO for Medicare patients in the Rochester and Southern Tier areas. **Marjorie S. Norton**, of Montour Falls, NY, died October 12, 2005. Norton was the first woman chief of anesthesia and first woman chief of staff of Schuyler Hospital. She also founded and became the first director of the Schuyler County Office of the Aging Medical Insurance Counseling Program. In 2002, Governor George Pataki appointed Norton to the Advisory Committee for the New York State Office for the Aging. She is survived by her husband, **James J. **Ronald A. Passafaro**, of Fredonia, NY, died January 8. Dr. Passafaro began his private practice in 1957 in Fredonia and later maintained an office in Dunkirk until retirement in 1992. In 1967, Passafaro provided volunteer medical services in South Vietnam for three months under
