Cleaning and Disinfecting Stethoscopes

Applies to All Providers

Emergency Care Research Institute (ECRI) Alert:

- Stethoscopes can become contaminated with infectious agents which contributes to the spread of healthcare-associated infections (HAIs).
- Approximately 85% of stethoscopes foster bacteria
- For use in any healthcare setting, stethoscopes should be cleaned between each patient.

Cleaning Procedure:

- Wear protective gloves
- Wipe device surfaces and accessories with hospital approved equipment disinfectant wipes (includes headset, stem and chest piece)
- Equipment used on multiple patients needs to be wiped down after each use
- For visibly soiled stethoscopes use disinfectant wipe and then disinfect again using a new wipe
 - o Bleach wipes: PDI wipes: surface must remain visibly wet for 3-minutes
 - o PDI wipes: surface must remain visibly wet for 2-minutes










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Best Practice Advisory for Creutzfeldt-Jakob Disease

Applies to All Providers

Effective September 2019, a new **BestPractice Advisory (BPA)** will display when an Inpatient Clinician clicks Sign for the **Creutzfeld-Jakob Disease (LAB8883) order**. The BPA alerts the ordering provider that they or a designee must contact the Laboratory to inform of "Special Pathogen." The ordering provider **must acknowledge the BPA in order to sign** the order.

The lab order for **Creutzfeldt-Jakob Disease** contains **Process Instructions** as well as a link to **Policy CM P-58: Guidelines for the Care of Patients with Known or Suspected Prion Disease.**

CDI Tip of the Month - Severe Sepsis in September

Identification and Diagnosis

Below organ dysfunction(s) must be stated as "due to sepsis" and cannot be attributed to any other disease process to qualify for severe sepsis

 Hypoperfusion POC (iSTAT) or Serum Lactic Acid >/= 2.0 Capillary refill > 3 seconds Skin mottling Cold extremities 	 Acute Kidney Injury Healthy Kidney: Serum creatinine > 2.0 mg/dL CKD with baseline creatinine > 2: Serum creatinine increase >/= 0.5 mg/dL above baseline Urine output <0.5 mL/kg/hr for at least 2 hours with documented monitoring

One organ dysfunction present AND persistent hypotension evidenced by: In the hour after the conclusion of the target ordered volume of crystalloid fluid administration, two consecutive documented hypotensive blood pressure readings

One organ dysfunction present AND tissue hypoperfusion evidenced by initial lactate level result >=4 mmol/L

Sepsis bundle, including targeted fluid resuscitation of 30 mL/kg, must be initiated and documented. Re-evaluation and repeat lactic acid required at 3 and 6 hour mark from recognition of Lactic Acidosis >2 and/or organ dysfunction(s) identified.




CDI Tip of the Month - Severe Sepsis in September <u>Protocolized Treatment: The Sepsis Bundle</u>

Targeted fluid resuscitation of 30mL/kg must be ordered and initiated when severe sepsis is identified

Lactic Acid measurement every 3 hours from initial until normalized (serum or iSTAT)

Blood cultures must be obtained prior to antibiotic administration Broad spectrum antibiotics ordered and administered within one hour



Patients require reassessment within one hour after severe sepsis identification and initiation of sepsis bundle protocol management

Documented reassessment every 3 hours is required for sepsis with organ dysfunction as defined by the NYS DOH

- > after identification of sepsis -and-
- > initiation of sepsis bundle -and
 - until severe sepsis resolves

Document progression of care, status improvement or decline, physical exam findings, vital signs, signs of organ dysfunction
