A message to the Upstate Medical University community

Dear Colleagues and Friends:

Visionary. Innovative. Impressive. These words come to mind after a visit and tour last week with Senator John DeFrancisco of Upstate's Central New York Biotech Accelerator, located just a few blocks on the northern part of our campus. Inside this 21st century facility are a half dozen start-ups focusing on drug development and discovery, biomedical applications for treating cystic fibrosis and skin diseases, and other health and environmental issues.

It's also home to our work in Precision Medicine and the Upstate Theater in the MIND (Medical Innovation and Novel Discovery). Both efforts are being championed by Pathology Chair Dr. Robert Corona and have the capacity to improve the human condition and how we deliver health care. Imagine medical care where disease treatment and prevention is tailor made to reflect your environment, your lifestyle and your genetic makeup. This is research that is underway here at Upstate.

The CNY Biotech Accelerator and the work we support and do here should be a source of pride to us all. It touches on all facets of our mission: education, research, health care and community.

It is fitting then that this center will host Upstate's first Presidential Symposium on October 28 and 29, featuring keynote speaker Mary-Claire King, PhD, the noted geneticist and discoverer of the BRCA1 gene. Dr. King is not only an incredible scientist but a human rights activist. In 1984 she and her laboratory worked on the Abuelas de Plaza de Mayo (Grandmothers of Plaza de Mayo) in Argentina, using genetics to identify 59 of the missing children whose mothers "disappeared" under the Argentine military dictatorship. Her visit with us will exemplify not only the highest level of science but the application of science to do good. All students, faculty and staff are encouraged to attend the colloquium. The sessions will be interactive and engage us all in thinking about the opportunity to change our world for the better through knowledge.
