SUNY Upstate sees growth in number of volunteers, Advocates

The number of volunteers and Advocates at SUNY Upstate Medical University and its University Hospital has grown from 325 to more than 470 during the past year.

According to Donna Stoner, director of Volunteer Initiatives at SUNY Upstate, there are four key reasons for the rise: an increase in the number of teen and college volunteers, a growing membership in The Advocates for Upstate Medical University, a strong retention program and the creation of new programs, such as the End-of-Life Companion Program that places a specially trained volunteer at the bedside of a dying patient to provide comfort.

“Key to an effective retention program is relationships,” said Stoner. “There are similarities between staff satisfaction and volunteer satisfaction and retention in that individuals want to be acknowledged for their contributions on a regular basis and they want to know that their role is meaningful. We place a good deal of emphasis on

communications with volunteers, individually and as a group, which results in greater commitment and higher retention.”

SUNY Upstate’s volunteers give more than 44,000 hours of recorded service annually to University Hospital patients and their families.

“Our volunteers are committed to improving the quality of life in our community and they find that volunteer opportunities at University Hospital help them fulfill a desire to help in a meaningful way. They also take to heart the responsible role they play in the university’s mission of improving the health of the community.”

The volunteers are acknowledged and thanked in a variety of ways such as with service and milestone awards at the annual volunteer appreciation event held in the spring.

“This year we recognized Margaret Shaw for her 25 years of service as a volunteer in the Infectious Disease Clinic, as well as others who have served 15,

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Biotechnology Research Center receives grant for bioprocessing research

The Central New York Biotechnology Research Center (CNY BRC) and its partners, the Hilliard Corp., Corning Inc., and SUNY College of Environmental Science and Forestry, have been awarded a \$250,000 grant from the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA) to fund bioprocessing research.

John Fieschko, PhD, executive director of the CNY BRC, said the grant will fund bioprocess development work for the production of biofuels and bioproducts from renewable resources using a novel, energy efficient filtration system.

A key component of the grant work will be the testing of a sturdy filtration system that is a necessary element to bioprocessing.

Hilliard Corp. will develop the filtration system using a ceramic membrane manufactured by Corning Inc. The filtration system will be designed and tested using the large scale

fermenters at SUNY-ESF.

"Separating microbial cells from fermentation broth is essential to bioprocessing, and the development of a high quality filter, such as the one created by Corning, is essential to this process," said Fieschko.

"Industry is always on the lookout for a durable filter that can stand up to the pressure of the sterilization process, be energy efficient and excel at ridding unwanted microorganisms from the product," he said.

A filtration system, such as the one to be tested, could also be used in food and biopharmaceutical manufacturing applications that require the separation of microorganisms from fermentation broths.

Fieschko said the project funded by NYSERDA is an excellent example of how the Central New York Biotechnology Research Center can foster progressive partnerships among business, government and academia to advance ground-breaking research. "We

all have a level of expertise that we bring to the table with the common goal of improving society," Fieschko said.

He also noted that the parties involved in this project all have a Central New York connection. Hilliard Corp., is based in Elmira and Corning Inc., has its world headquarters in Corning.

"Over and over, we continue to see how this region is moving forward in the area of bioprocessing," he said. "It's clear that we need to create even more opportunities that will increase the number of participants in these projects to bring the greatest benefit to this region."

The Central New York Biotechnology Research Center is a public/private partnership involving SUNY-ESF, SUNY Upstate Medical University, the Metropolitan Development Association of Syracuse and Central New York the Syracuse VA Medical Center and various corporations and industry associations.

vendors will be ZTF by September 2007; and all baked goods supplied by Morrison-approved vendors will be ZTF by December 2007. Zero trans-fat is defined by the FDA as containing less than 0.5 grams of trans-fat per serving. Morrison will continue to work with its suppliers to eliminate artificial trans-fat from the products and procurement channels, while also continuing to assess product alternatives and labeling measures.

10 or five years,” said Stoner.

“We also recognize our volunteers for surpassing milestones in the number of hours they volunteer,” said Stoner. Emma Puderbaugh volunteered more than 12,000 hours of service until her retirement last November, followed closely by Nancy Cornell who logged 11,500 hours of service.

Stoner adds that it is important to acknowledge individual contributions as well as combined efforts.

“We publish a yearbook that includes individual service awards as well as many program accomplishments. The yearbook is distributed at the annual appreciation event and distributed to hospital and campus leadership.

Recently, Volunteer Initiatives added a new category of service—Emeritus Volunteer—for volunteers who make unique contributions to the program and who are leaving active service, perhaps to move or retire.

Recognition is not limited to volunteers. Departments are also recognized by the presentation of the

annual Powerful Partnership Award. The award recognizes one department annually for its strong volunteer/staff relationships that enhance patient care. Departments are nominated by volunteers. Applications are reviewed and finalists and the winners are determined by the Volunteer Initiatives Advisory Council.

The Regional Oncology Center received this year’s Powerful Partnership Award due to the staff’s respect for volunteers and the guidance they provide so that volunteers are successful. Award nominees were the Breast Care Center, Central Distribution, Heart/Cardiopulmonary, Medicine Department, the Pediatric and Adolescent Center at UHCC, the inpatient psychiatry unit and Spiritual Care Services.

“This is our third year of recognizing staff who collaborate most effectively with the volunteers that serve their department,” said Stoner. Past Partnership winners were Palliative Care Services (2005) and Vision Care Services (2006).

“There is evidence all around that our volunteers make a positive difference with patients, their family members and the entire SUNY Upstate family,” said Stoner. “But what we hear time and time again from the volunteers is that their volunteer service at SUNY Upstate has a positive effect in their lives as well.”

Stoner adds that 45 teen volunteers participated in a full day orientation on June 25. Volunteer Manager Rhonda Butler has been interviewing and working on placements for the group that she will also supervise over the summer months. Their service will add up to more than 2,000 hours in several dozen departments and provide meaningful service experiences for the students.

Advocates for Upstate Medical University award \$109,000 in grants

The Advocates for Upstate Medical University recently announced \$109,000 in grants to 45 SUNY Upstate and University Hospital programs and projects through its 2007-2008 grant funding program.

According to Advocates’ immediate past co-president Cindy Dowd Greene, the funding will support programs that enhance patient care and advocate for the health and wellness of the Central New York community.

“Last year we awarded 43 grants for a total of \$75,000. However, due to the success of this year’s fundraising efforts, we were able to increase our grant funding reserves.”

Perhaps the most visible of The Advocates’ fundraising efforts is Mystery and Merlot. The March event, the ninth annual, broke attendance and revenue goals, with the support of premier sponsor, POMCO. According to Mystery and Merlot Chair Cindy Gambell, this

year’s event raised \$24,000. Half the proceeds of the event are shared with University Hospital’s nursing 3R program.

The Advocates’ presented a third check for \$30,000 to the Upstate Medical University Foundation to be applied to The Advocates’ pledge of \$150,000 for the Golisano Children’s Hospital.

In addition to the Advocates’ fundraising efforts, the organization also sponsors other projects, including hospital-based blood drives, activities and events for Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation patients, community-based smoking cessation classes, membership development, and fundraising.
