Membership votes needed on updated bylaws

Over the last few months, a committee comprised of Advocates' Board members held virtual meetings to update our Bylaws. Their efforts led to a more streamlined document that did not change the scope of our mission, but whose guidelines are more clearly defined.

The updated Bylaws were approved by the Advocates Executive Board and Board of Directors during April meetings. The Bylaws will be mailed to those members who do not have an email address. All votes on the updated Bylaws by general membership should be received in the Advocates Office via email or mail by Wednesday, June 23.

"Our Bylaws were last updated in 2014 and not fully updated in more than 12 years," said Committee Chair Theresa Devennie. "Since then, lifestyles have changed. People are seeking volunteer positions that require shorter lengths of time and a more convenient way to meet."

- A simplified mission statement: "The Advocates is a membership organization comprised of volunteers whose mission is to support initiatives at SUNY Upstate Medical University and its campuses through fundraising and service."
- A Student category added to class memberships.
- Paring the number of people serving the Executive Board from 9 members to President/Co-President, Senior Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer.
- Paring the number of Directors from 20 to 15 with no more than 25.
- Paring the term length of Board members from 4 years to 3 years
- Board meetings may be held virtually. Email is an acceptable means of communication.

Advocates provides nearly \$62,000 in grants
