Micro market comes to Upstate Community Hospital

REFRESH express micro market, the most exciting new concept in workplace refreshment, is coming to

Upstate Community Hospital later this Spring. Offering a healthier, more convenient alternative to vending machines, the micro market is provided by American Food & Vending, an Advocates for Upstate contract partner.

"REFRESH express presents an opportunity to provide some new and exciting initiatives with American Food & Vending within this area," said Ken Redmore, Associate Administrator for

Facilities and Support Services at Upstate Community Hospital. According to Redmore, the micro market will share space with the hospital's Discharge Hospitality Center where patients who have been discharged await transportation, freeing up beds for new admissions.

This self-service retail market will be stocked regularly with a limitless selection of foods and beverages, including gourmet salads, entrées, wraps, sandwiches,



fresh fruit, hot and cold drinks, snack products and more.

REFRESH express will occupy the site of the former Bee Loved Gift Shop, located in the hospital's Main Lobby.

"REFRESH express brings an entirely new level of freshness and variety to a typical workplace setting," said Tony Kurec, chair of Advocates for Upstate's Contracts Committee. Kurec says that the micro market will also feature a Starbucks Serenade, a state-of-the-art coffee maker that grinds and brews Starbucks whole bean coffee,

fresh for your cup.

According to Robert Yourdon, key account manager for American Food & Vending, customers can pick up and examine product options before making their selections and completing their purchase with a quick, simple transaction. "REFRESH express not only will offer fresh and healthy products, but it will turn the former gift shop location into a refreshing oasis for employees and visitors," said Yourdon.

Advocates support Spiritual Care at Upstate

John Stafford, who was President of the Auxilliary

at Community General Hospital at the time of the merger with Upstate, passed away on March 24 at the age of 86.

John started out as a volunteer leader in the Emergency Room at Community. An avid golfer, he always participated in the Community General Auxiliary Golf Tournament. John was vital in supporting the transition of the Auxiliary into becoming part of Advocates for Upstate.

In his 18 years of volunteer service, John accumulated more than 7,000 hours.

Contracts update

Due to COVID-related issues, Café Kubal has permanently closed at Upstate University Hospital. In its place, American Food & Vending has installed machines that dispense healthy beverages and food options. PerkUp Café & Bistro, located in the main lobby of Upstate University Hospital, remains open providing coffee and limited food options. Lori's Gift Shop continues to be open for business.

Bee-Loved Gift Shop at Community has permanently closed. The space has been converted into a patient-waiting area that will include the REFRESH express micro market (see page one for more details) providing 24-hour service. This service is anticipated to open within the next several weeks. The contract with American Food & Vending for the remaining vending machine operations at Upstate Community Hospital is in its final stages and is expected to be executed in early June.

The Advocates' contract with TeleHealth, which provides TV service to both University Hospital and Community, is under review.
