Promoting good nutrition for special needs children

The upcoming Golisano Center for Special Needs will significantly increase Upstate's capacity to help children with special needs.

Two vital programs of the Center are this year's beneficiaries of Mystery, Malt & Merlot– a Feeding Therapy Room and the Professional Development and Enrichment Fund.

In the Feeding Therapy Room, board certified behavior analysts and licensed psychologists will assess and treat a variety of feeding difficulties in children with special needs that are related to a severe level of food refusal behaviors. These behaviors may include food selectivity (e.g. consuming only a few non-nutritive foods), food refusal (e.g. presence of a gastronomy tube) or developmentally restricted food consumption (e.g. school-aged children who only consume baby food and/or drink out of a bottle). The specialists will work to ensure that the child is receiving the right nutrition, eating in an ageappropriate way and given the skills needed to overcome their feeding difficulties. Clinical services will be supplemented with in-home visits to ensure the child continues to consume all foods successfully with his/her caregiver in the natural environment.

The Professional Development and Enrichment Fund will support and promote networking education and research opportunities to enhance the level of expertise and further professional development of faculty and staff at the center. These development opportunities will lead to training in new lines of clinical service to further meet the needs of the special needs population in the community by permitting Center staff to receive additional training to address current unmet needs such as social skills development, in-home behavior therapy for children with autism, and helping adolescents with special needs transition to adulthood.
