How to Apply to SUNY Upstate

REGULAR ADMISSION

The majority of students accepted to SUNY Upstate apply through this traditional route.

Step 1: Apply through AMCAS

Most medical schools, including ours, participate in the American Medical College Application Service (AMCAS). Applicants complete a standard application, and submit official transcripts and scores from the Medical College Admission Test (MCAT) by October 15. AMCAS then transmits the application and scores to the medical schools you designate. For more information, go to www.aamc.org

Step 2: Complete the SUNY Upstate College of Medicine application

Following AMCAS, applicants complete the College of Medicine Secondary Application. All materials, including letters of reference are due by December 1.

SPECIAL ADMISSIONS OPTIONS

Early Decision is a program for outstanding students who are only applying to SUNY Upstate College of Medicine. Requirements are the same as for regular admission, except the application deadline is August 1.

Upstate Accelerated Scholars guaranteed acceptance program offers students an opportunity to secure acceptance to medical



school as early at their senior year of high school. Entrance comes after graduating from a select participating college.

The Early Assurance Program offers early acceptance to college sophomores. Applications are due by July 1. Students must also submit SAT or ACT scores. Interviews are held in August following the the applicant's sophomore year with early acceptance decisions made in September. More at: www. upstate.edu/com/admissions/options

THE INTERVIEW

Approximately 800 applicants are invited to the SUNY Upstate campus each year for a personal interview between September and March. Of those, approximately one in four is accepted into the College of Medicine on a rolling basis. Interview Days consist of a meeting with other applicants, the Dean of Admissions, current students, lunch, a campus tour and interviews. Interviewers look for personal qualifications such as resposiveness, warmth of personality, ability to adjust to social situations, poise, communication skills and motivation.

CAMPUS VISITS

Pre-advisement sessions are held the first Tuesday of every month to go over the admissions process. There are also two University Open Houses in the Fall and Spring of each year.

MEDPREP ACADEMIC ENHANCEMENT MS IN

MEDICAL TECHNOLOGY provides a one-year course of study designed to help college graduates strengthen their academic credentials to apply to medical school. Students experience a rigorous didactic curriculum to demonstrate academic preparedness for medical school. Matriculation in the program guarantees an admission interview with our medical school.

SPECIAL PROGRAM OPTIONS

There are a range of programs to help our students find the type of medical experience they most desire.

MD/PHD PROGRAM for students interested in pursuing careers in medical research and academic medicine.

MD/MPH PROGRAM for students interested in pursuing careers in public health and medicine.

RURAL MEDICAL SCHOLARS

PROGRAM provides mentoring and allows students to spend a portion of their third year at a rural site where they participate in comprehensive care of patients.

EXTERNAL ELECTIVES can take students anywhere from New York City to Bolivia as they pursue their particular interests, in depth, for 12 weeks.

Essential Requirements for Medical School Applicants

A ll medical schools want students who are smart, willing to work hard and work well with others. In selecting students for admission, medical schools consider grades, MCAT scores, health professions advisor recommendations, and work or volunteer experience in a medical or health-related setting or a social service activity. In particular, our Admissions Committee considers the following factors when selecting applicants:

- Academic achievement in the sciences
- Volunteer and clinical experience
- Communication skills
- Meaningful experiences dealing with and relating to people
- Personal character, and motivation for selecting a career in medicine.

Students admitted to SUNY Upstate must complete the following courses. (All science courses, except Biochemistry, must include a lab):

- General Chemistry 6-8 semester hours

Medical School is Four Years, Following College

Our College of Medicine's four-year curriculum integrates basic and clinical sciences from day one. Students also tailor their experience with a large array of electives. The basic sciences are covered in the first two years. The third and fourth years (clinical years) are considered a single unit. Students rotate through clinical clerkships becoming part of of health care



teams in hospitals, specialty clinics, and doctor's offices. Through patient encounters, reading and discussion with faculty and staff, students apply their knowledge of basic and clinical science to maintain patients' health and to evaluate, diagnose and manage clinical problems. Students assist and perform medical procedures with gradually increasing responsibility under the supervision of faculty and house staff.

Students in the MD/PhD program add three years to their study; students earning an MPH add one year.

In the fourth year, students apply for medical residencies where they will complete their training after graduating with their MD degree. While many of our graduates go on to practice in New York state, SUNY Upstate alumni can be found across the nation, as prominent physicians and innovative leaders. A career in medicine is one of enormous satisfaction and lifelong fulfillment.
