Risk of Using Alternate Languages of Medical Care

When communicating with patients for whom English is not their preferred language, please be sure to use the interpreter services (either live interpreters or phone services). Attempting to communicate in a language that is not your native tongue can be risky and should be avoided. Even for those of us who communicate fluently in another language, we may not be fluent in the *medical terminology* of that language. Back Door Transfers

Applies to All Physicians

Transfers Informational Wanted to remind you that when agreeing to accept a patient in transfer from another hospital, please be sure these calls are routed through our Transfer Center. These conversations should be on the recorded line for your medicolegal protection. In addition, the Transfer Center can help coordinate bed finding and ensure that we do not run afoul of EMTALA laws. Back door transfers place you, the hospital, and the patient at risk and should be avoided.

Would like to take a moment to ensure that everyone is aware of Upstate's antibiogram. Within the antibiogram you will find organism/susceptibility data for both the outpatient and inpatient settings. Recent case review highlights an opportunity to clarify that optimal antimicrobial selection varies between outpatient and inpatient populations. In the community, a patient presenting with an uncomplicated urinary tract infection may respond well to Trimeth/Sulfa, yet an inpatient would likely require a different antimicrobial selection for effective treatment. Kindly, take a moment to review our antibiogram and feel free to reach out to Infectious Disease staff for guidance in use.

ALERT-Highest priority emergency communication; warrants immediate action or attention by the recipient.

HIGH ADVISORY-High priority does not warrant immediate action but recipients should be aware.

ADVISORY-Provides very important information for a specific incident or situation that does not require immediate action.

UPDATES TO ALERTS AND ADVISORIES-Provides updated information regarding an incident or situation; unlikely to require immediate action.

INFORMATIONAL MESSAGE-Provides timely information, important for review or serves as a reminder for an action that should be taken.
