Collection Tube Shortage Change to Gold Tubes

Due to a critical shortage of the Light Green Top tubes used for chemistry testing, samples for the majority of chemistry should be drawn using Gold Top tubes starting NOW. 5th Generation Troponin testing can <u>only</u> be performed on samples drawn in Light Green Top tubes, so Troponins must be drawn in Light Green Top tubes. Instructions for which tube to use for each assay will be updated in Collection Manager and Epic as quickly as possible. Please see the attached guidance for more information.

It is with profound sadness that we mourn the passing of our dear friend and colleague, Dr. William H. Marx. Consequently, the Department of Surgery has established the Dr. William H. Marx Endowed Lecture in Trauma Surgery at the Upstate Foundation to honor and perpetuate Dr. Marx's legacy at Upstate Medical University.

The endowed lecture will provide funding for a visiting professor and nationally known trauma surgeon to visit Upstate, give a lecture on care of the injured patient, and support career development of residents/faculty as trauma surgeons.



Dr. Marx joined the faculty at Upstate Medical University in 1993. He served as division chief of trauma, burns and acute care surgery and trauma medical director and operating room director at Upstate.

Beyond Upstate, his legacy includes being the chair of the state trauma advisory committee since 2006 and chairing the verification review committee of the American College of Surgeons Committee on Trauma. He was also affiliated with the Syracuse VA Medical Center for nearly three decades. Clearly, Dr. Marx's legacy at Upstate and beyond is a profound one.

Clinical Documentation Improvement February 2022 Tip of the Month COVID related conditions

Applies to all providers

Link diagnoses & manifestations to COVID-19 when present and due to COVID-19

- When documenting a COVID infection, specify whether it is asymptomatic or linked to another manifestation.
- To link, use format: **Diagnosis/Manifestation** due to COVID-19

Some examples that may be caused by COVID-19:

Confirmation of COVID-19 **does not** require documentation of a positive test result

• The providers documentation of their validation that the individual has COVID-19 is sufficient.

Clarify if current admission is due to active COVID-19 infection or sequelae from prior infection.

NATIONAL SHORTAGE OF ALL BLOOD COLLECTION TUBES

- ➤ Light green tubes are now **CRITICALLY LOW**
- Light green tubes are the <u>only</u> tube that can be used for troponin testing.

To conserve light green tubes for Troponin testing

- ➤ Use **gold top tubes** for the <u>majority of chemistry testing</u>.
- Collection instructions are being updated in Epic and in Collection Manager to indicate that gold top tubes should be used.

GOALS:

PILOT BEGINS 4/1/2022

- Decrease Safety Intelligence "SA" events involving Heparin & Lovenox not being restarted after being discontinued for procedure or medical reason
- Improve patient quality and safety
- Enhance Communication between healthcare providers regarding medications being placed on hold in EMR
- Track & Trend Data regarding medication holds

KEY POINTS INPATIENT RN:

SUBCUTANEOUS
HEPARIN &
ENOXAPARIN SODIUM
(LOVENOX)
ONLY

Only Medical Providers can place an order in EPIC to <u>HOLD or UNHOLD</u>. **Nurses can not accept verbal/telephone orders for medication(s) placed on hold.

Heparin and Lovenox "Provider Holds" will remain in EPIC indefinitely until managed by medical provider or DC'd.

In EPIC, Nurses will be able to visualize "Provider Hold" in MAR, Manage orders & the Brain but it will not show up on the Worklist.

Post-operative patients will need to have Heparin or Enoxaparin Sodium reordered/reconciled if placed on hold prior to procedure. It will <u>not automatically</u> reorder when MAR hold is released postoperatively.

Medical Providers are expected to review medication holds during daily rounds.

Medication is resumed, the RN will be notified via Brain or work list for next dose or medication will be highlighted as overdue.






