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New Education – Epinephrine for Anaphylaxis "New Adult Auto-Injectors" By Scott Murray

Epinephrine 0.3 mg auto-injectors "Pens" will replace epinephrine vials in ALL Adult anaphylaxis kits (Inpatient and Outpatient) in mid-November 2022. *Pediatric anaphylaxis kits will remain unchanged at this time.*

This was a recommendation from the Medication Safety Committee pursuant to numerous medication errors (2022) related to the administration of epinephrine for anaphylaxis and is in response to a Department of Health (DOH) plan of correction.

The above change built upon our quality improvement last year (2021) with the Anaphylaxis Kit, which included:

- Making Adult and Peds kit
- Both included:

•

- Epinephrine 1 mg/ml 1 ml vial
- Diphenhydramine 50 mg vial
- Methylprednisolone 125 mg vial
- Enhanced labeling
 - Bolded route IM
 - Specific dosing (Adult 0.3 mg and 0.01 mg/kg Peds)
 - Adult kit included EpiRite slip tip syringe (0.3, 0.15. 0.1 ml calibrations only)
 - Pediatric kit included 1ml slip tip syringe

Review of Institute for Safe Medication Practices (ISMP) recommendations and literature in this matter, were applied to our institutional practice. Neither source recommend specifically to utilize a Epinephrine vial or autoinjector. They state, regardless of which Epinephrine source utilized, that there is clear labeling and education. There are advantages to both, for example, autoinjectors are the best for ensuring **IM** route and vials are more adaptable for Adult and Peds dosing. The converse, autoinjectors do not facilitate Pediatric specific dosing below 10 kg and vials allow for overdose and do not delineate IM route.

That said, Medication Safety Committee (MS) was the conduit for the multidisciplinary discussion, in conjunction with Quality and Risk Management, to globally serve our Adult and Pediatric populations, with least moving parts. The result are the two kits below that include consideration of national and our institution input. MSC will continue to review any report of issues regarding the use of these kits for Anaphylaxis and recommendations therein.

This past Summer, the United States activated "**988**" – the nationwide phone number to connect directly to the Suicide and Crisis Lifeline. As a result, Telecommunications made changes to the Downtown Campus phone system to ensure users could dial this new service directly. Making this change, however, now requires anyone dialing a toll-free number starting with 888 – to dial a 1 before the telephone number. For example, you will need to dial **9-1-888-xxx-xxxx** to reach a toll-free number starting with **888**. Leaving out the **1** would connect you with the Suicide and Crisis Lifeline. No changes were needed on the Community Campus phone system since that system has always required a **1** for all tollfree and long-distance calls. Dialing **988** from any Community Campus phone will connect you with the Lifeline as well.

As you are likely aware, there is increased circulation of several respiratory viruses in recent weeks, including RSV, the Flu and COVID 19, especially among our pediatric population. The Department of Health is monitoring regional hospital capacity and is engaging hospital and health care systems that may be seeing larger than normal patient volumes in their emergency departments and inpatient units.

Care is best delivered to children from their medical home and it is in everyone's best interest for sick children to be evaluated in their medical home prior to sending a child to an emergency department. Hospital emergency departments and inpatient capacity are best maintained for those children in need of this level of care. Parents are being reminded to contact their pediatricians if their child is sick and exhibiting symptoms of a respiratory virus. We are reminding pediatricians to do their part at preserving hospital capacity for those children in need of hospital level of care.

CDI Tip of the Month – Adult Mortality Risk Adjustment

Mortality risk adjustment is most often based on conditions and circumstances present at hospital admission (POA). Conditions commonly affecting mortality risk adjustment:

CDI Tip of the Month – Pediatric Optimization

The key to reflecting the severity of illness (SOI) within the pediatric population is providing documentation related to diagnoses. Common diagnoses that impact pediatric optimization of SOI include:

Sepsis	Consider when patients meet SIRS criteria and have source of infection – this can be viral or bacterial – rather than documentation of SIRS and infection. If SIRS are not related to the infection, please specify the cause in your notes to clarify.
Acute Respiratory Failure	Consider when patients receive supplemental oxygen at minimum of 3 liters with an underlying pathology – this could be pulmonary or cardiac related, sepsis, neurologic related, etc. 'Acute respiratory distress' is a symptom that does not clearly reflect the severity of illness, especially when children are receiving oxygen or respiratory support.
Disorders of Fluid & Electrolytes	Consider when patients have acute or chronic electrolyte abnormalities – especially acute metabolic acidosis – and link to underlying cause.
Malnutrition	Co-signature of the Dietician's note is sufficient to code a malnutrition diagnosis. Best practice is to ensure provider documentation reflects etiology of the condition, treatment provided, and response to treatment.
Chronic Conditions	Chronic conditions, especially behavioral or psychiatric in nature (ie: Autism, Tourettes, etc.), are relevant to hospitalizations in that special considerations may be made or treatment may be tailored to meet individual needs. Document the chronic conditions in the Assessment and Plan, noting contribution to medical complexity or decision making.

Documentation Tips

When any diagnosis is made by other providers earlier in admission or in the Emergency Department, ensure the diagnosis is carried through the record, reflecting treatment and response to treatment, or clarify you have ruled the condition out. Inconsistency will result in query.

Ensure all diagnoses are carried into the Discharge Summary to ensure completeness of the record and to allow the Discharge Summary to serve as a communication device to outpatient providers. There is a difference in a patient being admitted for Sepsis and Acute Respiratory Failure secondary to infection, rather than an infection with respiratory distress.

Ensuring documentation is both present and complete will help mitigate query volume and optimize severity of illness in all pediatric patients.
