Daily COVID Screening By Paul Suits

Screening healthcare employees for symptoms of and exposure to COVID-19 is a requirement of the New York State Department of Health Public Health Law and required of DNV and CMS for healthcare facilities.

Daily compliance for staff screening is down to 67% from about 82% in the past six months. Chatbot use is down to 400 per day and staff badge scans are down to 2,500 per day.

The COVID-19 screening process is as follows:

New EPIC Ordering Process for Specialty Beds, Mattresses, & Mattress Pumps By Jolene Putney

- A summary of changes includes:
- Mattresses, beds, and mattresses pumps are all located in one panel for ease of ordering.
- Each order defaults for 60 days. If the patient is discharged before then, the orders discontinue. The goal is to keep the 60 day default when ordering.
- When ordering, all hard stops must be completed prior to signing to ensure the correct mattress, bed, and/or pump are ordered for the patient.

Dear Provider:

This letter seeks to clarify language in New York State (NYS) Public Health Law (PHL) related to the provision of abortion care in New York State.

Under New York State <u>Public Health Law § 2599-BB</u>, abortion is legal in the State of New York when the patient, "is within twenty-four weeks from the commencement of pregnancy, or there is an absence of fetal viability, or the abortion is necessary to protect the patient's life or health." To ensure that New York State-based providers are offering abortion care in alignment with current standards of practice, the Department now defines "commencement of pregnancy" to begin with the implantation of a blastocyst(s).

Previously, a 1993 letter from New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH) General Counsel Peter Millock defined the commencement of pregnancy to be at the time of conception, which is typically two weeks after the last menstrual period. Since that letter was issued, medical and scientific understanding has evolved and that definition is no longer regarded as clinically accurate. The new definition stated above aligns with the definition of pregnancy as stated by the American College of Obstetricians & Gynecologists (ACOG) in its <u>revitalized:</u> <u>Gynecology Data Definitions</u> released in 2018. Per ACOG, pregnancy is defined as "a *physiologic state of a woman that follows implantation of a blastocyst(s).*" This definition was developed by ACOG and is formally endorsed by an additional 12 professional medical organizations, including the American Academy of Family Physicians, the American College of Nurse-Midwives, and the National Association of Nurse-Practitioners in Women's Health.

Pursuant to the PHL, for an abortion needed after twenty-four weeks from the commencement of pregnancy there must be "an absence of fetal viability, or the abortion is necessary to protect the patient's life or health." For determining whether an abortion is necessary to protect the health of a patient, the Department has identified the following categories of factors which should be considered: physical, emotional, psychological, familial, and age of the patient. Any factor within these categories may be considered relevant to the well-being or health of the patient and should be taken into consideration by healthcare providers when making abortion determinations related to protecting patient health. This understanding of health as it relates to abortion care aligns with current and longstanding NYSDOH guidance outlined in the "New York State Medicaid Program: Policy Guidelines Manual for Article 28 Certified Clinics."

Please keep in mind that pursuant to Article 25-A of the PHL (the Reproductive Health Act) and PHL § 2504, any pregnant person, regardless of age, may consent to an abortion without parental consent.

Healthcare providers offering abortion care should continue to exercise their clinical judgment within the parameters of the PHL, as outlined above. Providers offering abortion care are encouraged to ensure that clinical policies align with public health law and the definitions outlined above. Additional questions related to public health law may be directed to the Department for further consideration as necessary.

Dear Chief Executive Officer:

The purpose of this letter is to remind providers and hospitals that they are required to order diagnostic testing for glucose-6-phosphate dehydrogenase (G6PD) deficiency for infants at increased risk for this condition.

Newborn screening is mandated in NYS Public Health Law §2500-a and 2500-f. In 2022 the statute was amended to add G6PD deficiency to the list of newborn screening conditions in New York. G6PD deficiency was not added to the panel of conditions screened by the Newborn Screening Program through testing of dried blood spots, instead the law requires newborns be given a diagnostic test for G6PD deficiency if they:

- Present with hemolytic anemia
- Present with hemolytic jaundice
- Present with early onset increasing neonatal jaundice persisting beyond the first week of life (bilirubin level greater than the 40th percentile for age in hours)
- Are admitted to the hospital for jaundice following discharge
- Have a familial, racial, or ethnic risk of G6PD deficiency (African, Asian, Mediterranean, or Middle Eastern ancestry)

Newborns and infants who meet any one of the above criteria must be tested for G6PD deficiency using a quantitative test.

Hospital Requirements

Hospitals should put systems in place to ensure that infants meeting any of the above criteria be administered a quantitative test for G6PD deficiency.

QPR is a one-hour training that instructs participants to recognize the signs of a suicidal crisis and how to question, persuade, and refer someone for help. Similar to CPR, an emergency medical intervention, QPR is an emergency mental health intervention.

Key Components Covered in Training:

- How to Question, Persuade and Refer someone who may be suicidal
- How to get help for yourself or learn more about preventing suicide
- The common causes of suicidal behavior
- The warning signs of suicide
- How to get help for someone in crisis
