Description

The US is home to more than 40 million immigrants who come here for economic, educational and other reasons. We also welcomed nearly 70,000 new refugees in 2013 as part of the State Department's sponsored resettlement program. More than 3 million refugees have arrived in the US since 1975, and nearly 90,000 asylum seekers sought refuge in the US in 2012 alone. From Maine to Minnesota, Ohio to Oklahoma, Florida to Texas, global health is in our backyards.

Individuals from these populations bring with them a wide variety of health practices, risks and conditions. What are the challenges of working with these vulnerable populations? This talk will familiarize those in the health professions with the cultural, social, psychological, rights-based and clinical issues affecting these populations and consideration for opportunities to research and create programs aimed at clinical care and community support for refugees, migrants, and asylum seekers.
