### Welcome, William Sullivan, PhD



The Dept. of Pediatrics, along with the Div. of Development, Behavior, and Genetics welcome their newest faculty member, Dr.

William Sullivan. In his official Crier interview. Dr. Sullivan tells the Crier. "Hello, everyone! My name is Will Sullivan. I am from a small city in West Virginia about an hour outside of Pittsburgh, PA. I completed my undergraduate work at West Virginia University where I met my lovely wife Laura. We arrived in Syracuse in 2011, both to pursue graduate degrees. I completed my Ph.D. in School Psychology with an emphasis in Applied Behavior Analysis and my wife received her Master's degree in social work, both from Syracuse University. My journey at Upstate has been underway for quite some time now. During my second year of graduate school, I had the opportunity to take an assistantship at the Family Behavior Analysis Program (FBAP) under the supervision of Dr. Hank Roane. After that, I was lucky enough to return to the FBAP to complete my pre-doctoral internship and post-doctoral fellowship. During that I time I also held an adjunct faculty position in the Communication Sciences and Disorders Department at Syracuse University where I taught courses in Applied Behavior Analysis and Research Methods. Currently, my clinical work at the FBAP primarily focuses on the treatment of severe forms of challenging behavior displayed by children with developmental disabilities.

On the research side of things, my interests are largely translational. That is, I am interested in translating findings from basic operant research into effective interventions for challenging behavior, as well as taking applied phenomena and analyzing them under basic preparations to better understand the mechanisms responsible for behavior change. I am truly excited to be officially joining the department and look forward to the work we will do together!

#### Taking up Residents in Kenya

Several of the residents have been, or plan to go to Kenya along with Dr. Shaw for a global health rotation this year. One of them, Jake Anderson, shared some of his adventures with us:

As part of the Upstate Global health program Dr. Andrea Shaw and two pediatric residents, Sarah Ellis and Jacob Anderson, spent four weeks at Obama Children's Hospital in Kisumu Kenya.

This opportunity allowed our staff to gain clinical exposure to the unique pathologies that exist in Sub-Sahara Africa such as malaria, rabies, rheumatic fever and more; while also experiencing clinical medicine in a recourse limited environment. The



wonderful clinicians in Kenya incorporated us into their medical teams from day one and often asked for our feedback on many complicated cases.

One of the most rewarding aspects of the trip was the chance to teach medical students. All three of us were incorporated into teaching curriculum and we were able to develop formal lectures, lead bedside teaching and rounds, and also taught them basic procedures.



The team was able to enjoy some of the local wild life at Impala Park in Kisumu and also went on a "bike safari" where they rode mountain bikes though Hell's Gate National Park and were able to experience African wildlife up close.



Dr Andrea Shaw will continue to collaborate with our global health friends in Kenya. She plans on making several trips per academic year with a new group of residents.
