Kenya with Carlee

Phil and I spent the month of August in Kisumu, Kenya! WOW what a crazy adventure we had. Not only was this global health rotation academically challenging but also life altering! An experience that can only be learned when you are forced out of your comfort bubble. We both returned to the USA stronger, more patient, and humbler doctors than before we left. This journey quickly makes you grateful for the resources we have here in the USA. The Obama Children’s Hospital is a world of its own. You walk in and you are immediately pulled to do work. There is always something to do, someone to help, or someone to teach. This hospital is the referral hospital serving more than 100 districts and sub district hospitals in more than 10 counties in Western Kenya. From diagnoses I had never heard of to typical febrile seizures, the amount of pathology from bed to bed (sometimes in the same bed) was undeniably impressive. Over the course of just a few weeks we were able to become comfortable with leading rounds, teaching medical students, and offering advice to families. When not assisting on rounds, we would spend time stabilizing patients. We both quickly learned about available medications and treatment options for a limited-resource center and how to make do with what you have. It was both thrilling and terrifying working alongside the team in Kisumu, and everyday brought a new challenge. Each child that came into the hospital offered something new to learn. Teaching medical students was also a highlight of this trip. From pediatric pathologies to hands on CPR lessons, we were both able to teach willing and motivated young future doctors about our passion- pediatrics. It was also rewarding to have hands go up at the end of a lecture with curiosity bursting throughout the room.

It was not all work and no play. Phil and I also had the opportunity to go on Safari at Masai Mara (you may recognize from National Geographic and Planet Earth!) We saw lions, elephants, cheetahs, hippos.. We saw it all! We spent 2 nights in a tent and even explored a Masai village! You will see Phil in one of the

pics taking part in one of the tribe ceremonies! Another weekend we were also able to climb the rainforest in Kenya called Kakamega! The views were stellar!

It is hard to put words on a blank paper descriptive enough to explain how I was impacted by my experience in Kenya. I was challenged to learn by living and am left with a renewed sense of passion, peace, and joy for life. I hope to continue with this mentality, investing in my relationships and honing my sense of purpose within my own community. I will never forget that Kenyan smile and will cherish the experience for the rest of life.



Thank you, Dr. Kennedy

We would like to take a few moments to specially thank Dr. Gloria Kennedy for her seven years as our program director. Since she did so much of her best work quietly without drawing any attention to herself, the Crier thought it would be worthwhile to name just a few of her accomplishments.

Under her leadership, in 2019 we received our highest scores on the ACGME resident survey and were higher in many areas than the national average. She created a Wellness Curriculum which included a weekly Noon conference series and wellness days built into the schedule. She created the academic half day of teaching conferences with protected time for residents. She created and developed the four Career Pathways as a part of our curriculum based on the new recommendations of the ACGME. We saw our Board Pass Rates rise by 20 points over the past two years. After our last ACGME site visit, we are fully accredited with no citations. She was able to increase our resident complement by two residents per year, and she worked hard to obtain a resident work space/lounge in the Children’s Hospital (coming soon).

As a part of wellness, she has continually worked toward creating a fun and enjoyable



work environment for the residents including purchasing them tutus, capes, and silly socks. She has knitted each of the new moms a baby hat or sweater. She has kept the lounge and library continually stocked with snacks she has purchased with her own money. And she purchases treats for each of the monthly “Food and Feelings” sessions with Anne Reagan. There are countless other unseen acts of caring and kindness she has done throughout her time as program director. This is just a small sampling of what Dr. Kennedy has done for our program over the past seven years. I hope she knows how much she is appreciated and how much she will be missed. Especially by her residents.

The Mike Bristol Crystal Award

Congratulations to Dr. Steve Blatt who received the "Mike Bristol Crystal Award at the CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocate) Gala on 9/20. The award is given to honor a community member who has shown exceptional commitment to improving the lives of Central New York’s most vulnerable children. This was to recognize his many years of directing the ENHANCE program for foster kids.



Dr. Howard Weinberger was asked to give some comments at the ceremony and he was kind enough to share them with the Crier since they also give some of the rich history of our department:

‘It’s a special pleasure for me to have been asked to make some comments about Dr Steven Blatt, in recognition of his CASA award tonight. In doing so, I will emphasize the second A in CASA – Advocacy – because that is Steve’s strength and why we are honoring him tonight. I should briefly mention my ‘credentials’ as the person in the room tonight who has known Steve in his professional life about the longest – perhaps, even longer than his wife, Liz.

I first met Steve, in my capacity as a long term member of the faculty at Upstate Medical University, when Steve

was a med student, trying to decide on a specialty for his career. Later, during his Residency in Pediatrics, I was one of the Directors of our Residency Program where I watched him develop his clinical skills. After completion of his Residency, Steve left Syracuse for further training during a Fellowship at U of Pittsburgh. We were successful in recruiting Steve back as a Junior faculty member in the General Pediatric Division when I was the Director of that Division. We quickly became colleagues and I recognized his commitment to care for the ‘underserved’ children we saw in our outpatient clinics.

In an ancient Hebrew text, titled Pirke Avot – translated as Ethics of our Fathers, Ben Zoma is quoted as saying: Who is wise? And he answers: He who learns from everyone. My greatest pleasure, as a faculty member, occurs when I can learn from my students. Now that I am almost retired, Steve is my supervisor, and I have the pleasure of learning from him every week in our clinic. And I see how he mentors those young doctors and nurses who together continue to care for the underserved children and their families.

Almost 30 years ago, I was asked by staff at the Onondaga County Dept of Social Services to develop a program to provide medical care for children in Foster care – at the time, there were almost 900 kids in Foster care at any one time. As a smart administrator, I delegated the request to Steve Blatt who accepted the challenge and called the program ENHANCE which stood for Excellence in Health Care for Abused and Neglected Children. Steve and the staff he recruited have been outstanding advocates for the children and families they serve and it has been my greatest reward to have watched Steve himself develop into such a forceful advocate for children.

Steve’s interest in Advocacy was not a surprise development. His late father, Burton Blatt, was Dean of the School of Education at SU where he developed The Center on Human Policy. His career was dedicated to improving the lives of people with disabilities. (As they say, the apple doesn’t fall far from the tree.) After Burt’s death, Steve and a co-author published a monograph entitled ‘In Search of the Promised Land- The Collected Papers of Burton Blatt.’ In a closing few reflections on his father’s legacy, Steve wrote about his father, ‘The issues that Burton Blatt wrote about in the early 60’s are still present 40 years later. The details of the problems may have changed, but the good

advice that he wrote about many years ago remain constant. He expressed thoughts on the right way and the wrong way to interact with another human being. He stated that *To observe sorrow untouched is to cause it to continue.*’

I think those same words could be said about our honoree tonight. Just like his father, Steve is an optimist. And just like his father, he always does his best to make the world better.”
