# **LCME ANNOUNCEMENT**

**March 24-27, 2019** the Upstate Medical University College of Medicine will host a visit by an ad hoc team representing the Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME), the official accrediting organization for educational programs leading to the M.D. degree in the United States

LCME review preparations are comprehensive and will require a sustained and focused effort over the next 2 years. The process leading up to the LCME site visit involves an extensive data collection effort. Several committees will be formed with an estimated 100+ faculty, students, administration, staff, and alumni.

In the fall of 2017, medical students will be organizing an Independent Student Analysis (ISA). Student engagement is a key cornerstone of LCME review. The ISA will independently review LCME compliance from students' perspectives, and make recommendations for improvement that LCME Committees will need to address in our review.

The LCME accreditation process provides an excellent opportunity for the members of this medical school community to deepen our understanding of all aspects of our M.D. degree program and to implement quality improvements through our formal self-study process. As you are aware, Upstate's most recent site visit resulted in probation, and we must learn from that experience and seriously focus efforts to address any compliance gaps identified in the self-study. In addition, we will highlight our strengths and accomplishments and build upon our history of excellence and highlight our new curriculum in medical education to maintain full accreditation of our outstanding M.D. program. <a href="https://www.lcme.org">www.lcme.org</a>

# MIDDLE STATES ANNOUNCEMENT



In the **fall of 2018**, Upstate Medical University will host a visit by an ad hoc team representing the Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE).

The MSCHE comprehensive review process, which began in January, will be based on a self-study report that Upstate will prepare during 2017-18, followed by a site visit of evaluators who report to the MSCHE. During the self-study process,

working groups will address our compliance with each accreditation standard and our process of continuous evaluation, planning, budgeting and improvement. A broad cross-section of the Upstate community is expected to participate in each component of the self-study process as part of the Steering Committee, the Working Groups, and campus-wide discussions.

Accreditation is intended to strengthen and sustain higher education, making it worthy of public confidence and minimizing the scope of external control. Regional accreditation, a means of self-regulation adopted by the higher education community, has evolved to support these goals.

Upstate Medical University was most recently reviewed by the Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE) for its Periodic Review Report (PRR) in 2014 at which time we were reaffirmed for accreditation and commended for the quality of the PRR. Upstate's last decennial comprehensive evaluation and reaffirmation of accreditation status occurred in the spring of 2009. <a href="https://www.msche.org/">https://www.msche.org/</a>

# **Graduation Questionnaire for MS4s**

The AAMC's Graduation Questionnaire (GQ) should have arrived in your inboxes on February 14<sup>th</sup>. Dean Dewan has authorized \$300 to be deposited into your Class of 2017 account if at least 80% of your class completes the GQ by March 10. When 90% have completed the survey by Match Day, an additional \$200 will be deposited into your account. This can be used to fund graduation and Match Day related activities. Your completion rates as of February 23, 2017.

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




# Phase 1

This remains such an exciting and critical time for Phase 1 and the new curriculum. Currently, we are wrapping up the first year of the "UP" (Unified Preclerkship) Curriculum in the MS1 year and are in the design phase and implementation phase of the MS2 year (Class of 2020). Much like our holiday party at the "Mystery Room"/Destiny USA (highly recommended), the Curriculum Office, Course Directors, Thread Leaders, Coordinators and basic science departments are learning that collaborative efforts are key in this process. We continue to find opportunities for more clinical relevance in Phase 1 as it is one of our most important goals.

We continue to celebrate the successes we have had implementing the first year of the "UP" curriculum as well as learning from any set-backs. Each Unit has been asked to present "lessons learned" after execution of their unit and it's been incredibly helpful sharing these ideas with all the co-directors and thread leaders in Phase 1, for the ultimate success of the curriculum as a whole. Dr. Greenwald's Peer Review Process and Dr. Greenblatt's "If It Has to be a Lecture, Make it a Good One" talk are wonderful examples. Our MS1 Unit Co-Directors and Thread Leaders continue to work hard to restructure our new courses and we applaud and celebrate their efforts. POM and FRM, our longitudinal courses have both held very beneficial faculty development sessions as well as holding feedback sessions with students. Some positive changes are already in the works as a result for all courses. MS1 faculty had an opportunity to review the Gateway Exam and learn more about vignettestyle writing, another goal of the new curriculum. We continue to hold MS1 Rolling Unit Reviews after each unit is completed and are almost done collecting inventory for the curriculum mapping process! We have used that data to track where each course stands in terms of hot topics given by the LCME as well as where threads are being fully covered in the curriculum throughout all four years.

In the MS2 year, we are wrapping up the year and onboarding MS2 Directors for AY 2017-2018. There will again be collaboration between Basic Scientists and Clinicians in the new MS2 "UP" Curriculum, as well as some Unit Director overlap between years, which is wonderful. New Directors are in the process of final selection of content for the launch of the MS2 "UP" Curriculum and meeting regularly in preparation of their units. The Foundations of Reasoning in Medicine (FRM) course, for the MS2 year, is also well into its planning stage. FRM2 will continue with clinical case small groups, now looking for a differential diagnosis, and will also incorporate Evidence Based Medicine (EBM).

# What's New in Phase 2

Congratulations to all of our graduating MS4 students. When you started medical school, graduation seemed far away and now match week is right around the corner. We wish you the very best as you move forward with this new chapter of your career.

As we are approaching the end of Academic Year 2016-2017, the Phase 2 Subcommittee is busy preparing for AY 2017-2018. MS 3 year will have an exciting orientation that is now five full days. The orientation will be held from May 22 to May 26. It will include ACLS training, Epic training, learning to gown and glove, and many more things that will serve students well in their MS3 year.

Students will also have an opportunity to meet with clerkship coordinators and clerkship directors. Our required clerkships and courses feature; norm referenced criterion grading where clerkship teams examined previous student performance data, and used them to determine appropriate cut offs for Pass, High Pass and Honors. These cut points are set and students informed of these cut points.

MS4 year will feature a required acting internship (AI) course so that all MS4 students will be well-prepared for residency training.

As a medical school we are constantly looking at how we can better train our students. Whether it be better integration of clinical and basic science in our UP Curriculum, more opportunities for service learning and volunteering in the community, or more innovative approaches to patient centered, interprofessional team based care, we want our students to be well equipped.

The curriculum committee has been looking at these areas as we review each MS1/2 courses and units, and each individual clerkships. Specific topics related to societal problems, social determinants of health, health disparities, and cultural humility are areas that span the entire curriculum that we are paying specifically close attention to.

As part of our upcoming LCME accreditation process (scheduled for 2019), we will be embarking on an important self-study process. The self-study opportunity will be an opportunity for faculty, staff, students, and residents to self-assess where we are as a medical school, our strengths as well as our areas to improve on. You will be getting more information, but a strong participation from the entire community will make this process even more meaningful.

The Curriculum Committee is also excited to integrate the new President's Strategic Plan into what the College of Medicine its curriculum will be focusing on in the upcoming years.



Dr. Mark Pearlman was this year's AOA Visiting Professor. # Class of 2018: Save the Date for the Clinical Skills Exam (CSE)

The Upstate Clinical Skills Exam (CSE) will be offered over a number of dates in May and June, 2017 (see list below). Taking and passing the CSE during one of these scheduled times is a graduation requirement for the College of Medicine.

Enrollment for this exam is available using MyUpstate (also known as Banner) (<a href="https://bannerweb.upstate.edu">https://bannerweb.upstate.edu</a>); you will sign up for a date to take your exam just as you would sign up for an elective course. Enrollment for the CSE begins on Wednesday, March 8, 2017 at 12:01 AM. We will send you more details in February about how to enroll for your preferred CSE date. The deadline to enroll for the CSE is Sunday, April 16, 2017 at 11:59 PM. The deadline for add/drop is also Sunday, April 16. Any student who does not enroll by April 16 will be assigned a date.

We have attempted to provide dates for the exam which stretch across two different periods. You are required to take the examination on one of these dates and should arrange your schedule to participate. Students who will be out of town for both periods should plan to return to Syracuse for a day during this time to take the exam.

All sessions for students at both the Syracuse campus and Binghamton Clinical Campus will occur in the Clinical Skills Center, on the basement level of the Setnor Academic Building, attached to Weiskotten Hall, on the Syracuse campus.

# **Exercise means less burn-out among medical students**



Recently, a Journal of the Association of American Medical Colleges study explored the impact of healthy exercise habits among U.S. medical students. The study revealed that students whose exercise habits are consistent with CDC guidelines (see article for guidelines) appear less likely to experience burnout and have higher quality of life. Think you don't have time for exercise because you're a busy medical student? Why not try to incorporate it into your day to help yourself out? What about taking the

stairs instead of the elevator (7 flights of opportunity from the hospital to Weiskotten!) or taking a walk/doing squats when you need a study break? Maybe bring healthier lunches or walk further than you normally would to buy lunch. You only get out of it what you put in and when a healthier diet and regular exercise routinely play a significant role in your physical and mental health, it's definitely worth the few extra minutes/efforts. In addition to reducing the risk of many medical conditions, diseases and some cancers, exercise relieves stress, boosts overall mood, and has positive impact on depression, anxiety and more. Who doesn't love endorphins?
