'Regulation of Body Weight' is topic of the 8th Annual Charles R. Ross PhD Research Memorial

Lecture Nov. 30

"Leptin and the Regulation of Body Weight" is the topic of the 8th Annual Charles R. Ross PhD Research Memorial Lecture to be delivered by Jeffrey Friedman, MD, PhD. Dr. Friedman is noted for his research on various aspects of obesity. The lecture will be held Thursday, Nov. 30 at 4 p.m. in the Medical Alumni Auditorium of Weiskotten Hall. Free and open to the public, the lecture is an activity of the 14th Annual Charles R. Ross, PhD, Research Poster Session.

Dr. Friedman is a professor at Rockefeller University and an investigator of the Howard Hughes Medical Institute. In late 1994, Friedman and his colleagues isolated the mouse ob gene and its human homologue. They subsequently found that injections of the encoded protein, leptin, decrease body weight of mice by reducing food intake and increasing energy expenditure. Current research is



Jeffrey Friedman, MD, PhD aimed at understanding the mechanisms by which leptin transmits its weight-reducing signal.

Dr. Friedman was appointed assistant investigator with the Howard **Hughes Medical Institute** at Rockefeller University in 1986, promoted to associate investigator in 1991 and investigator in 1997. He was appointed professor at Rockefeller in 1995 after serving as associate professor and head of the Laboratory of Molecular Genetics since 1991. In 1998 Dr. Friedman was awarded the Marilyn M. Simpson Professorship. In 1995 he was appointed director of the Starr Foundation Center for

Wireless ethernet technology now available on Upstate Medical University campus

Wireless Ethernet technology is now available to members of Upstate Medical University thanks to the efforts of Computer Operations and Telecommunications, a division of Information Management Technology. By using mobile wireless computers, Upstaters could potentially have mobile access to the Internet, email and web-enabled clinical applications.

According to Donald Roller, manager of Upstate's Network Communications, IMT staff spent several months evaluating, testing and implementing wireless Ethernet connectivity to the Upstate Medical University computer network and telecommunications system using a variety of wireless mobile devices.

"With the involvement of Clinical Engineering, an independent radio frequency survey was conducted to make sure the technology would not interfere with





critical medical equipment," said Roller.

The Emergency Department was one of the first Upstate departments to take advantage of the technology.

"The Emergency Department has implemented four standard Dell notebook computers that are connected to Upstate's data network via wireless access points and wireless Ethernet cards. Registration staff has the flexibility to move these portable computers throughout the Emergency Room for direct access to patient information via CAIS while conducting patient registrations. Working with Joe Ziemba, manager of telecommunications, Emergency Room physicians also recently tested wireless Ethernet phones (not to be confused with cell phones) that utilized the same wireless access points across the data network." The telephones were fully integrated with the campus phone system," said Ziemba.

IMT is currently working with Orthopedic Surgery to implement wireless connectivity at the Institute For Human Performance. The connectivity will be used for motion analysis research in the track and gym area," said Roller.

According to R.J. Dollard, manager of desktop support services, various mobile devices have been tested, including Dell notebook computers, the iPAQ Pocket PC from Compaq, and the Jornada Handheld PC from Hewlett Packard.

Dollard notes that the technology for mobile wireless devices is still evolving and will change quite often in the near future. "IMT staff will continue evaluating new devices as they become available," he said.

Dollard noted that much work still needs to be done in the technology field to optimize applications and web sites for mobile devices. Industry analysts expect the market for mobile and wireless technology to grow significantly over the next two years.

The wireless network equipment utilizes industry standard IEEE 802.11b Ethernet technology. Upstate Medical University has standardized on wireless network equipment from Cisco Systems.





Cut and Save: Tips from Upstate Medical University's Mail Center

Each day, the Mail Center at Upstate Medical University processes 14,000 pieces of mail. According to mail room supervisor Brenda Rodriguez, six employees handle it all, from the pick up at each department to the final sorting of each item. Despite the high volume, the Mail Center strives to turn internal mail around in 24 hours and send out U.S. Mail the day that it is received.

In order to efficiently handle the mail in a timely manner, the Mail Room is requesting the help of all Upstate Medical University individuals by:

- ensuring that the return address "MUST" have a
 Department indicated in the upper left hand corner of all
 outgoing mail.
- referring to the Upstate homepage, www.upstate.edu/search/phone directory to ensure that the mail that you receive at work has your complete and accurate listing. Your listing must include:
 - A. your name
 - B. department
 - C. building
 - D. designated mail drop or pickup area. (The mail staff does not deliver to individual rooms.)

 Contact Human Resources (not the Mail Room) regarding any changes or if your listing is not complete. If you do not have access to a computer, your address on your issue of Update will serve as your guide. Human Resources will accept only one listing per person;
- giving the Mail Center advance warning for large mailings of 1,000 pieces or more. Flats (oversized envelopes of 300 pieces or more also warrant advance warning.

- calling the Mail Room if any "overnight mail" is expected. This would include Airborne, DHL, Federal Express, US Postal and UPS (Note: when overnight deliveries are expected on a Saturday, it is the responsibility of your individual department to contact the Mail Center staff. You will need to make appropriate arrangements to pick up or have the parcel delivered to an accessible area);
- using Upstate Update, UpstateAnnouncements, the Upstate Calendar or other campus-wide communication vehicles to publicize your event rather than sending individual publicity flyers;
- not using the Upstate Mail Room to receive or deliver your personal mail. Upstate's Mail Center is to be used only for Upstate-related mail. Please mail and receive your personal mail from your home or other site;
- using typed labels on all outgoing mail in order to take advantage of Upstate's discount postage rate. Be sure that the address includes the zip code. Upstate Medical University must pay the full postage rate for mail that is addressed by hand;
- sorting internal and external mail and placing them in their appropriate pick-up boxes. Once again, be sure that addresses include name, department, building and room or unit number.

In addition, it is the responsibility of each individual department to forward mail for those individuals who are no longer with your department.

Upstate's Annual Report rated as "best" from Profiles in Healthcare **Marketing**

SUNY Upstate's 1999 Annual Report, produced by the Office of Public Affairs and University Communications, was rated as the best annual report produced by an academic medical center last year. The honor comes from Profiles in Healthcare Marketing, which each year rates annual reports for hospitals, medical centers and medical schools from across the country.

The 1999 Annual Report from SUNY Upstate, titled "Focus on Research," highlighted various research projects being undertaken by SUNY Upstate faculty.

Annual reports were judged on overall impression, the goal of the report and how well it conveyed information and its appearance, such as the cover and interior design and use of color and graphic elements.

Judges praised the overall appearance of SUNY Upstate's Annual Report, especially the Year in Review section. "[This] section, unlike those in some reports, uses full-size type, lively headlines and professional photos," noted the judges. "The result is a section that seems more like news than history."


