Campaign supports community agencies

"Even a small donation can help," said Howe. "To date, we have collected \$407,794 toward our goal of \$510,000."

Campaign chairpersons are Phillip S. Schaengold, JD, MBA, chief executive officer of University Hospital and senior vice president for hospital affairs, and Laura Schweitzer, PhD, vice president for academic affairs.

SUNY Upstate Medical University will create 46 new faculty positions in a sweeping faculty initiative designed to strengthen its academic mission, increase enrollment and enhance Upstate New York's research prowess. The initiative will also benefit the local economy as it is expected to add at least \$5 million to the Central New York payroll bringing millions of dollars more in research growth to the area.

"The return on this investment is going to benefit all," said David R. Smith, MD, president of SUNY Upstate Medical University. "It will not only bring significant enhancements to our academic mission, but it will enable us to attract and recruit top-flight researchers who will bring new intellectual capital to Central New York with the promise of greater collaborations between industry and academe."

Deadline to reject commission's recommendations is Dec. 31

New initiative to increase enrollment and enhance research

New York State Legislature has until Dec. 31 to reject in its entirety a set of sweeping recommendations by the Commission on Health Care Facilities in the 21st Century, otherwise known as the Berger Commission, to restructure the state's hospital and nursing home systems.

Included among the recommendations is the merger of University and Crouse hospitals to be restructured as one, 500 to 600 bed hospital, that will be operated privately under an entity other than the State University of New York (SUNY).

While SUNY Upstate officials agree that the state's healthcare crisis needs to be addressed, they differ with the commission's recommendations to privatize University Hospital and urge that more time is needed to responsibly consider the full ramifications of the targeted recommendations.

SUNY Upstate officials support the premise of operating University and Crouse hospitals as one. They maintain that the medical university and University Hospital should remain aligned with the State University of New York to ensure that public health needs will be met and that the educational, clinical and research missions of SUNY will not be diminished.

SUNY Upstate officials also recommend that the hospital bed count fall between 700 to 750, as the hospital will take on more patients from hospitals in outlying areas that may close due to market reality. The *continued on page 6*

University Hospital earns high praise, commendation for its cancer care

The Commission on Cancer of the American College of Surgeons has granted University Hospital a three-year approval award with commendation in recognition of the quality and caliber of the its cancer program. University is the only hospital in Syracuse with a cancer program accredited by the American College of Surgeons.

"This approval illustrates the commitment of the hospital administration and its medical staff to the integrated care of cancer patients both within the hospital system and in the community," said Leslie J. Kohman, MD, vice chair of cancer commission at University Hospital.

University Hospital earned the Commission on Cancer's highest marks in many areas, including cancer committee leadership, cancer data management, clinical services, research community outreach and quality improvement. The commendation designation follows a rigorous review of the cancer program's operations and care standards.

The commendation ensures that all patients receiving cancer care at University Hospital have access to comprehensive care, including to state-of-the-art services and equipment; a multidisciplinary team approach to treatment; information on clinical trials and new treatment options; cancer-related information; support and education; and a cancer registry that collects data on cancers, treatment and offers lifelong patient follow-up.

Established in 1922 by the American College of Surgeons, the Commission on Cancer is a consortium of professional organizations dedicated to improving survival rates and quality of life for cancer patients through standard-setting prevention, research, education and the monitoring of comprehensive quality care. Its membership includes fellows of the American College of Surgeons and 40 national organizations that reflect the full spectrum of cancer care.

University Hospital, which treats more than 1,600 patients annually, offers comprehensive cancer treatments for a broad range of cancers, including thoracic, breast, brain, spine, blood, bone, gynecologic and genitourinary.



bed census will also allow for growth in SUNY Upstate's four colleges.

In the meantime, University Hospital will continue its collaborations with Crouse Hospital to make Central New York's healthcare delivery more efficient, something that both hospitals have been working on for years.

In addition SUNY Upstate officials are providing testimony and working with State University of New York leadership and unions to oppose the recommendation to privatize University Hospital.

Payroll Services announcements

The Payroll Services Office will be closed Monday, Dec. 25 and Monday, Jan. 1.

Schedule for the holiday paycheck/direct deposit distribution:

- New York State employees: The final paycheck for 2006 will be distributed Dec. 27.
- Research Foundation (RF) employees: The final paycheck for 2006 will be distributed Dec. 22. Checks will be available Dec. 22, from 8 a.m. to noon, for RF employees who pick up their paychecks at the Payroll Services office. Paychecks for RF employees that are not picked up by noon, Dec. 22, will be mailed to the employee's current mailing address.
- Federal college work study students and student assistants: The final paycheck for 2006 will be distributed Dec. 21.
- Direct deposits will not be affected by the holiday. They will be sent to financial institutions on the regular pay date.

Payroll and tax information:

- Employees who filed tax exempt in 2006, including student employees, must file a new federal W4 form and/or State IT2104 form by Feb. 15 to maintain exempt status. If a new form is not filed, Payroll Services is required to withhold federal and/or NYS income tax at the highest possible rate: single with zero withholding allowances.
- The Social Security Administration has increased the Social Security wage base from \$94,200 to \$97,500 for 2007.
- The FICA tax rates remain the same for 2007—6.2 percent for Social Security and 1.45 percent for Medicare.
- To ensure that Payroll Services' 2006 tax information and withholding is accurate, verify your name and address on your paycheck/direct deposit stub. Individuals who request changes should contact Payroll Services (State employees at 464-4840 or STATEPR@upstate.edu; Research Foundation employees at 464-6350 or RFPRTEAM@upstate.edu). If not enough income tax is withheld throughout the year, employees may face a penalty when filing their personal income tax return.

Faculty and staff help achieve President Smith's "120 Days Agenda"

Before SUNY Upstate President David R. Smith, MD, took office in September, he met with employees from across campus. These discussions formed the heart of the "120 Days Agenda"—a slate of projects for the first four months of the new presidency. As the year wraps up, all 27 projects on the agenda have been launched and funded.

"The faculty, staff and council really helped move this forward," he commented. "Thanks to their enthusiasm we have been able to celebrate some significant early wins."

The initiatives support all areas of the campus, with an emphasis on bolstering the educational mission. The agenda includes: new scholarship programs, new programming and faculty, facility improvements for the Colleges of Health Professions, Nursing and the Regional Campus at Binghamton, renovation of the C.A.B. recreation facilities, information technology upgrades, an investment in campus image and an initiative with the Syracuse Community Health Center. Also included is the launch of the Engaging Excellence campaign, website redesign, new legislative processes, the formation of the Student Ambassador program, and the start of the strategic planning process.

One of the first items on the 120 Days Agenda was Dr. Smith's decision to expand the on-campus childcare center.

"We are thrilled with this plan," said Clare White, director of the Upstate Childcare Center. Under the proposal, the facility would approximately double in size. "We get calls every day from prospective parents, and we can only accommodate 66 children at present. On-site daycare is a draw for both employees and students." agenda is a women's leadership symposium, slated for March. The event would explore the role of women in science and medicine, highlight gains made in regional leadership-Syracuse University, SUNY Onondaga Community College, and SUNY Oswego all have female presidents-as well as feature special guest Donna Shalala, the University of Miami president who co-chaired the recent panel for the National Academies of Sciences report on gender bias in academic science and engineering.

"This symposium is a very positive event for our campus," commented Victoria Meguid, MD, associate professor of pediatrics and co-chair of SUNY Upstate's Women In Medicine group. "We hope that the enthusiasm generated by this event will carry over into other initiatives here."

The recruitment for the new faculty has already begun and officials hope to have most of the positions filled by fall 2007. Areas slated for the new faculty are the basic and clinical sciences, and positions for the new master's degree program in public health and for the new certified registered nurse anesthetist program, both of which are in development.

The faculty hiring initiative is being funded in part with increases in state support specifically earmarked for the university's academic and research mission, savings from unfilled administrative positions and a \$263,000 grant from New York's Empire Innovation Program, which rewards campuses for faculty recruitment efforts.

Perhaps the greatest beneficiary of the new faculty hiring initiative will be the university's research mission—and the upstate New York economy. Funded research support at the university now stands at more than \$37 million, up 13 percent from \$33.4 million in 2005. It is expected that many of these new faculty will bring with them to campus federal and privately funded research support.

"These additional faculty are essential for SUNY Upstate to continue its path of significant growth in its research enterprise," Dr. Smith said. "The value of a strong and prominent research enterprise cannot be underestimated either for its impact on the campus and our community." University officials are planning on an increase of \$250,000 to \$450,000 in new grant funding per faculty member that could result in a \$22.5 million boost to the local economy over the next several years. The increased research activity will also lead to new hiring, as faculty will recruit graduate students and other professionals in carrying out their research projects.

Dr. Smith noted that the increase in new faculty and research programming could lead to increased synergies between the various universities and high-tech companies that call Central New York home. "We welcome the opportunity to become more engaged in research excellence with our neighbors," he said. "Partnerships, such as these, can accelerate scientific discovery and bring a greater return on the investment from state, federal and private funding sources."

Dr. Smith said that investments in infrastructure must keep pace with investments in human capital. He said he would continue to work with legislators to gain support for new research space at the Institute for Human Performance and upgrades to existing space in Weiskotten Hall.

Additionally, the new faculty positions are essential as the university undertakes a commitment to increase enrollment, Dr. Smith said. "The investment we are making today in faculty is also an investment in students," he said. "More faculty mean more and varied research opportunities for students, more clinical rotation opportunities and enhanced faculty-student interactions."
