SUNY Upstate to participate in energy reduction drill this summer

SUNY Upstate Medical University has agreed to significantly reduce its electricity demand for one hour this summer on a day to be determined as part of its membership in the SUNY Electric Buying Group.

In addition to SUNY Upstate, 25 other SUNY campuses are members of the SUNY Electric Buying Group that enables the universities to purchase electricity at a reduced rate. In order to continue to receive those savings, the group requires all its members to participate in a one-hour energy reduction drill.

Here's how it will work: Campuses will receive 20-hour advance notice of the need to reduce power at a particular hour. Employees will be notified via Incident Command email when the energy reduction drill will occur. They also will receive a list of energy-saving steps to take during the hour. Such steps

Technology receives provisional patent from SUNY Research Foundation

Mohammad Haeri, a graduate student in the Department of Biochemistry and Molecular Biology and Eduardo Solessio, PhD, assistant professor in the Center for Vision Research of the Department of Ophthalmology, were members of a team that tied for second place in the Syracuse Panasci Business Plan Competition, held April 18 and 19 at Syracuse University's Whitman Business School. One-hundred teams participated in the competition.

Haeri's and Solessio's team, whose members received a combined \$7,500 to put toward their business concept, designed and developed an innovative and adaptable multicolor, multicontrolled LED-based light source for retinal vision studies.

Their innovative technology is green—saving on energy—and is less expensive than other light sources for retinal studies on the market. It does not have mechanical parts which makes it faster than other light sources

and allows for simultaneous multiple flashes—currently not available to researchers through other light sources.

The light source has received a provisional patent from the SUNY Research Foundation.

The team was advised by SUNY Upstate researchers Robert Barlow, PhD, and Daniel Tso, PhD, and faculty from Whitman School of Business at Syracuse University.


